Reaves Seeks Third Term in Legislature

Fred Reaves, present incumbent Assemblyman representing the 68th District, announced his candidacy for re-election for a third term this week.

"Should I be re-elected, I shall, as before ally myself with the other liberals and progressives in the Legislature and I shall continue to introduce and support legislation designed to help those that most need help," he declared. TWIN BILL AT PLAZA

"International Settlement," the picture of the hour opens tonight at the Plaza theatre in Hawthorne. The film deals with the adventures of a free-lance American pilot who finds himself in China's great metropolis as the city is engulfed in the maelstrom of conflict.

War sequences on a scale unduplicated since the filming of "The Road to Glory" are used in the massive production. Several thousand film players including hundreds of Chinese actors, have been engaged for the war scenes and other sequences.

Chief roles in "International Settlement" are taken by Dolores Del Rio, glamorous screen beauty, George Sanders, new star "discovery," June Lang, piquant little star, and Dick Baldwin, handsome young player.

"Battle of Broadway," which is based on the American Legion's "unconventional convention" in New York, Victor (Siz you) McLaglen and Brian (One punch) Donlevy arrive on the Gay White Way in the Legion vanguard to see what makes the cozy little village on the Hudson River so popular. This comedy is the second feature on the bill opening tonight.

McLaglen and Donlevy, both honest-off-screed veterans, "lend more than truth to this film than play-acting could ever devise. These battle-scarred veterans know all the maneuvers... and when they lay siege to beautiful Louise Hovick, "Battle of Broadway," like the Battle of the Marne, becomes nothing more than a whole collection of fights conveniently filed under one heading.

Around Hollywood Film Lots

HOLLYWOOD (U.P.)—Although Katharine Hepburn does not try to imitate Greta Garbo, she is as much of an enigma to Hollywood as the Swedish sphinx. Yet Miss Hepburn is no great mystery to those who work with her, whether they be stars or stagehands. To them she is a very natural, entirely unaffected person.

Although she will not discuss the stories told about her, Miss Hepburn's friends declare she has incurred the wrath of some gushing film writers because she declined to be a goldfish at the expense of the privacy she enjoys off the movie lots.

George Cukor, now directing her in "Holiday" for Columbia,

was her first director. Their mutual attitude is one of good-natured friendship, never that of diplomat and queen or of whip-cracking trainer and sulky tigress.

Technicians and actors, working with her for the first time, find Miss Hepburn friendly, frank in manner and speech and interested in the doings and welfare of those about her, they report.

She is sociable—but not society-minded. She hates swanky parties but loves little informal tea parties on a studio set.

She plays chess with cameramen, electricians or anyone else who enjoys the game. She has aided numerous bit players by recommending them for more important roles.

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'MARCO POLO' DUE SUNDAY

The screen, which lately has focused a majority of its bigger productions on biographical subjects, has seen many remarkable portraits of characters taken from the past.

Few of these historic personalities, however, enjoyed a life more significant and romantic than the Marco Polo so few people seem to know, whom Samuel Goldwyn has chosen as the hero of "The Adventures of Marco Polo," his rollicking, adventurous romance which brings Gary Cooper to the Torrance theatre Sunday for three days.

Marco Polo's journey to the Thirteenth Century court of the great Kublai Khan in Kumbalu, Peiping, had as its object the extension of private commerce and the development of new trade opportunities for the Polo Brothers, Nicolo and Maffeo, Marco's father and uncle, who were important merchants in the city of Venice.

Getting a girl to play the role of Kogatin (in the picture she is called Kukachin) was another problem which Goldwyn solved quickly, and as the years may judge it so, historically.

Over a year ago he placed a young Norwegian girl named Sigrid Gurie under contract and forbade her appearance in public. He settled her in the Hollywood Hills, kept away photographers and interviewers and 10 months later, in a typical Goldwyn gesture, placed her in the lead opposite Gary Cooper.
