How a Bird Sees Giant Boulder Dam



As mighty as the pyramids, earthquake-proof, bomb-proof, magnificent, Boulder Dam nears completion and stems the rising waters in man-made Mead Lake. This bird's-eye view from a United Air Lines plane gives a new angle on the dam, where an increasing crush of water is being harnessed for vast power and irrigation projects. By 1940 the waters at the base of the dam will be 500 feet deep, deeper than divers have ever plumbed, deeper than fish can swim.

Trojans Miss Louie at Big Berkeley Meet

Charley Paddock in his "Sport-orials" column of the Long Beach Press-Telegram has this to say this week about Louie Zamperini and the Pacific Coast conference track meet:

"We are bating for you, Louie Zamperini!" said Adrian Talley, co-captain of the University of Southern California track and field team last Saturday, over the radio, from Edwards Field, Berkeley, just after he had finished second to Lee Orr in 220 yards. Earlier in the day Talley took the hundred from a fine field. Like all of the Trojan stars he came thru for Louie.

"And in spite of the marvelous showing made by the Trojans in the Pacific Coast Conference meet where they scored 633.5 points to 471.10 for Stanford and 361.10 for California, some of us would feel a whole lot happier if Louie Zamperini should compete for U.S.C. in the big meets back East. For the ONLY events in which Southern California did not score out of the entire fifteen, were those which Zamperini could have won. "Of course, the Torrance boy would not have run in the two miles, mile and half-mile, but he could have won any TWO in which he participated. As a matter of fact, while his teammates were burning up the Berkeley cinders, Zamperini was running a practice mile at old Bovard Field in faster time than Burrows' new conference record."

MARINE LEAGUE SET-UP FOR FALL GRID SEASON IN DOUBT

Whether or not Banning high school of Wilmington will re-enter the Marine league for football and basketball competition next fall is still a matter of some doubt altho the school was instructed this week to return to the Marine circuit by the Los Angeles district advisory committee, which settles all matters of league affiliation and athletic policies.

It is well known that Banning is reluctant to come back to the Marine league with Torrance, Narbonne, Gardena and San Pedro. The Wilmington school was in the Pacific division last grid and basketball season and enjoyed the competition there. In the general realignment of leagues it appeared at one time that Rios, Jordan and Venice might be assigned to the Marine circuit, thus making seven teams but this set-up was dropped after it had at one time been announced as official.

Vice-principals of the Marine league schools met yesterday with Principal Thomas Elson at Torrance high school to start work drafting the 1938 football schedule but the game assignment was incomplete at the end of the session. Further conferences after the matter of Banning's re-entry or not into the league has been threshed out will be held in the near future.
