... would New Deal Sacramento

Resigning Tuesday as deputy collector of Internal Revenue service, John T. Rawls, former Democratic assemblyman for the 68th district, announced the following day that he would be a candidate for his former seat in the state legislature at the August primary election.

Rawls served as assemblyman for this district in the 1932-34 terms of the legislature and was short only 150 votes for the Democratic nomination in the 1936 campaign. He has been employed in the Internal Revenue department since the first of the year.

"A New Deal at Sacramento," was the campaign slogan sounded today by Rawls, "with equal rights for all and special privilege to none." He was the first Democratic assemblyman elected in this district in more than 50 years.

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Townsend Party Needs 17,000 More Voters

Unless some 17,000 more register as members of the Townsend party by June 16, the more than 6,000 already registered under that party designation in Los Angeles county will not be eligible to vote in the August primary, the county counsel's office ruled this week.

The law requires a total registration of 23,610 for any new party to have a vote in the primary elections. Only other method by which a new party may get on the ballot is by petition bearing 236,092 voters' signatures and presented to the secretary of state by June 16.

The Democratic registration in the county has gained 5,770 since March 1, to a total of 712,644 while Republicans have lost 929, leaving a total of 442,053.
