Mrs. Hills came to Southern California in April 1881 and lived with her older sister and brother-in-law on the old Hazard property at Third and Broadway. This land was owned by "Grandma" Hazard who crossed the plains in about 1851, a journey taking about two years.

Another memory connected with Methodist college which is treasured by the local woman concerns the time, back in 1882, when she was called into the Widney dining room with the Widney children to hear grace that preceded the first dinner-meeting of the board of college directors and their wives.
