3 Nabbed Here for Drunk Driving

Three men motorists were arrested here last week-end and charged with driving while intoxicated, according to police reports. Thomas Stanley Schloss, 40-year-old WPA worker living in Redondo Beach, was stopped at Cravens and Torrance boulevard early Saturday morning. He pleaded not guilty before City Judge Robert Lessing and was released on \$100 bail to appear June 29 for trial.

Tuck Ballard, 32-year-old Redondo Beach oil worker, was arrested at Gramercy and Cravens Sunday afternoon. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$50. Jack B. Young, 34-year-old oil worker of no address, was the third to be picked up on the drunk-driving charge. He was apprehended at Carson and Cabrillo Sunday night, pleaded guilty and was fined \$50.

Gambling Ship Is Moving to Redondo Beach

Reported enroute by towboat to anchorage off Redondo Beach is the gambling ship Rex which recently was the scene of some spectacular raids by county authorities at its Santa Monica bay station. Redondo's city attorney is said to have interviewed most of the business men in his city relative to their opinion of having the floating gambling palace in the vicinity and has been assured that nearly all of the landmen favor allowing the craft to anchor there.

It is understood that the Montad pier will be the connecting link between the gambling ship and the followers of "Lady Luck." The ship has 250 employees and its monthly payroll, according to word received yesterday by The Herald, is around \$75,000 monthly.

Council Session Covers Many Subjects of Civic Interest

Members of the city council transacted considerable business at their session Tuesday night. Among the subjects considered were:

A PERMIT TO BLAST tree stumps out with half sticks of dynamite off 182nd street between Arlington and Western was asked by Matthew Shepard, Lawdale stump puller. The police department will investigate and report at the next meeting.

DON FINDLEY, who is building a house at 2100 Cabrillo asked the city to remove two old pepper trees in the parkway and substitute red gums or carobos. The Street department was given power to act on the request after investigation.

CONTRACT FOR AUDIT of the city books, at \$225, and the accounts of the Torrance Municipal Water District, at \$200, by C. J. Rambo and the company was approved. Rambo's offer is the same as the price paid by the city for previous audits and quarterly reports.

NEW DIRECTIONAL SIGNS are to be installed on Western avenue and Carson street by the Automobile club without cost to the city.

THOMAS FORD'S application for a pool hall license for his cigar store at 825 Border avenue was referred to the police department for investigation and report at the next meeting.

INSTALLATION of a sodium vapor overhead light at the intersection of Highway 101 and Hawthorne avenue, requested by Walteria residents and said to have been approved by the state highway department will be considered by the city engineer who will report his findings at the next council session.

A REQUEST for an overhead light at 240th and Ward street in Walteria, transmitted to the council by City Engineer Leonard Young, was referred to the police committee of Mayor William H. Tolson, Councilmen McGuire and James Hitchcock.

POSSIBILITY that the city recreation center may be moved from the building now used for that purpose on Arlington avenue across from the city park appeared when it was reported to the council that the owner demands \$20 monthly rental for the coming year—an increase of \$5 per month over the rent paid during the past 12 months.

"That's too much dough for that shack," declared Councilman John V. Murray. The matter was held over until the next meeting.

APPROPRIATION OF \$35 to provide entertainment for the meeting of the Southern California Peace Officers' association here June 28 was voted after City Attorney John E. McCall said the donation could be considered as promotion. About 300 are expected to attend the session.

COUNCILMAN MURRAY and City Attorney McCall were appointed to serve as the city's representatives on the Southwest Highways Association board.

A STAFF has been made on the center-line survey of Hawthorne avenue, City Engineer Young reported, by the county. Originally set up as a WPA project, the state has appropriated \$2,000 to assist with the engineering work.

SUGGESTING that a woman be named to the Public Library board, Scott R. Ludlow, chairman, called the attention of the council to the fact that two vacancies will exist on that board after June 30. He said it would be "a fine gesture" to appoint a woman member to give her viewpoint on types of books, use of the library for children, and even offered to resign if such a move would place one on the board. Mayor Tolson, whose term is ending, said he would be glad to have a woman take his place on the library board and that the council would consider new appointments at the next meeting. William H. Stanger's term is also expiring.

'Spite Damage' Noted at Two Building Jobs

Two more homes under construction here were damaged this week but police believe the vandals were considerably older than boys who have been sought for other causing similar destruction.

The places being built at 2111 Cabrillo and at the corner of Beech and Sonoma had new wiring cut to pieces, according to police reports, leading to the belief that the damage was "spite work." Officers are maintaining a closer watch than ever on all new construction jobs now.

Crane Colony Nests in Trees CONNEAUT, O. (U.P.)—A colony of cranes inhabits a marshland 15 miles southeast of Conneaut. Within a radius of 100 feet there are 14 crane nests cradled in the topmost branches of tall trees.

Former Torrance Girl Wins High Nebraska Honors

Friends here who have continued to correspond with Miss Jeanne Streiwieser, who with her parents, is now living in Venango, Nebraska, were delighted this week to learn of the scholarship honors she won on graduating recently from Venango Consolidated high school.

She was president of her class during her senior year there and was awarded three scholarships—one to the University of Nebraska, one to Grand Island Business college and the third to Hastings college. She also received the highest grades of her class.

Out of a limited number of Nebraska high school students, less than 2,000, to take the University examinations in which 200 are given scholarships, Miss Streiwieser was rated one of the highest. She also entered a district contest and received highest honor in English from the University.

Miss Streiwieser plans to enter that institution in September. She will study nursing at Omaha where the University is located. While a student in Torrance high school she was assistant editor of the annual during her junior year and held a number of other offices. She was also a member of Job's Daughters of this city.

Building permits, totalling \$28,000 in valuation, were issued at the city engineer's office during the past week for five new wooden oil derricks in the South Torrance field and three residential construction projects.

M. J. Kingsbury is building a one-room addition to his home at 1214 Beech for \$200; E. W. Blackwood is erecting a six-room moved-in home at 3930 La Fresa for \$2,000, and Victor H. Johnson, Los Angeles, is constructing a three-room frame house at 2421 Sierra, costing \$800.

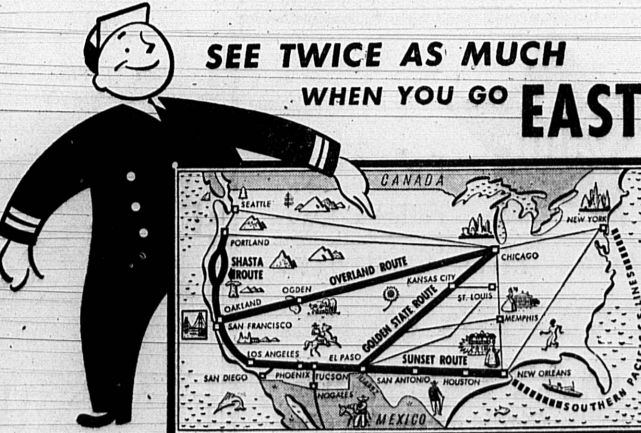
