### SWING TUNES TOPS IN NEW MUSICOMEDY

There are very few screen shows that can boast of the assortment of swing tunes heard

in the new Fred MacMurray comedy, "Cocoanut Grove," the new film that opens tonight at the Torrance theatre. Put across by MacMurray, radio songstress Harriet Hilliard, the Yacht Club Boys, Rufe Davis and Harry Owens and his band, they number six in all, and come from the pens of some of Hollywood's better known composers.

Swing is in order in this story of what happens when a crew of slap-happy musicians, hungry for fame, hungry for love, but most of the time just plain hungry, set off on a barnstorming tour across the continent to the world famed Cocoanut Grove, long called the "spring-board of the stars," and mecca for all aspiring young bandleaders. MacMurray is seen as the good looking leader of the orchestra, and in their various hilarious trials and tribulations across the country, they pick up Miss Hilliard, who blossoms out as the girl vocalist with the band, Rufe Davis, the Kansas hill-billy, who is also fame-struck, and the kid, Billy Lee. The smash musical climax of the piece comes when MacMurray makes the grade at the Grove and opens in a blaze of glory.

## Gay Story of Modern Life Has Fine Cast

Co-starring two of the screen's leading favorites, Ginger Rogers and James Stewart, "Vivacious Lady" offers a brilliant and up-to-date romance—to film-goers. It is scheduled for the Plaza theatre in Hawthorne starting Friday and running thru Monday.

The stormy love affair of a night-club entertainer and a studious young professor is the theme of this story, the action of which takes place in a sleepy little college town, in whose dignified atmosphere the heroine is astonished to find herself. The two stars have strongly colorful roles that give them notable opportunities to display their abilities, and they are given grand support by a hand-picked cast.

The settings range from the glitter of a Broadway night-club to the ivy-clad walls and sedate classrooms of the small-town college. And against these settings the conflict of modern romance with old-fashioned ideals is played in striking fashion. A sparkling modern ballad, "You'll Be Reminded of Me," is sung by Miss Rogers in the night club sequence.

## AROUND HOLLYWOOD FILM LOTS

HOLLYWOOD (U.P.)—Unlike most actresses, Kay Francis is not a saver of programs, press notices and photographs—with a few exceptions.

Among the souvenirs she has kept are some critics' enthusiastic reviews of her performance with Walter Huston in "Elmer the Great," on the stage, and in her first film, "Gentleman of the Press." She also treasures a newspaper interview with Huston in which he praised her acting ability.

Perhaps her most highly acclaimed picture was "One Way Passage," but she didn't save the press notices of that.

In her contract with Warner Brothers is an arrangement through which she may have "calls" from her pictures, especially made up for her on art paper with dull finish. She saves those which strike her as fine examples of photography—quite often she isn't in the pictures she saves. But even these collections are not extensive. She has given many away to other players in the scenes, or presented those of herself to friends who have taken a fancy to them.

Miss Francis has just finished work in a picture called "My Bill," which the studio believes is one of her best, and has started on another to be known as "Unlawful."

Because she has announced her virtual retirement from the screen this fall, Miss Francis is anxious to make her final two pictures as a contract actress good ones.

As has been announced in the press, Miss Francis is to be married to Baron Erick Raven Barkenow this fall, and she does not wish to be tied down to a contract that would keep her in Hollywood most of the year.

The baron has hinted that he will consolidate his financial interests into one airplane manufacturing concern of his own, and hopes he and Miss Francis will be able to become roving ambassadors for the company traveling to all parts of the world for business and pleasure. If they ever stop in Hollywood, London or any other film-producing center for any length of time, Miss Francis says, she may make a picture of two.
