Among the Scriptural selections
in the Lesson-Sermon are the pas-
sages from John: "But when the
morning was now come, Jesus stood

have ye any meat? They answered
him, No. And he said unto them,
Cast the net on the right side of the
ship, and ye shall find. They cast
therefore, and now they were not

fishes. . . . As soon then as they were
come to land, they saw a fire of
coals there, and fish laid thereon,
and bread. . . . Jesus saith unto
them, Come and dine."

The Lesson-Sermon includes also
this passage from "Science and
Health with Key to the Scriptures,"
by Mary Baker Eddy: "This spiri-
tual meeting with our Lord in the
dawn of a new light is the morning
meal which Christian Scientists
commemorate."

City Leases Its Gold Mine

In poor health for the past several years, Kenneth H. Acord, a resident at 1534 Marcelina for a number of years, passed away Saturday at the Olive View Sanitarium near San Fernando. Local Dairymen Guilty of Misuse of Milk Containers

Pleading guilty to a violation of the state agricultural code which prohibits dairymen from using registered milk containers belonging to other dairies or creameries, Wilbur H. Hornstra and Richard Hogerhuis, owners of a dairy on Hawthorne boulevard, were given suspended sentences Tuesday by City Judge Robert Lessing. Hornstra and Hogerhuis were named plaintiffs in the misdemeanor case by N. Volch of the dairy service, division of animal industry for the state. They were fined \$150 or 75 days each, of which \$100 or 75 days were suspended. They had to pay the remainder, \$50 each, or serve 25 days in jail.

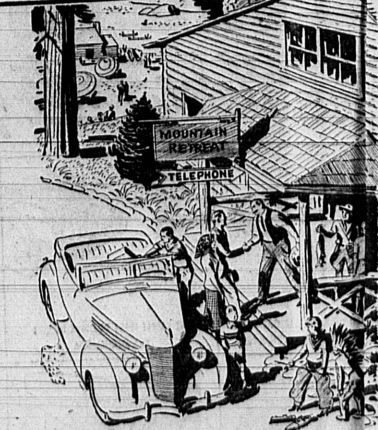


BAKED HALF HAM
