

Tax Deadline Is August 20

With only about five weeks remaining to pay delinquent taxes without penalties or to take advantage of the 10-in-stallment plan to pay them, Los Angeles county officials are anticipating a rushing business between now and the deadline, set for Aug. 20.

Payments showed a sharp upturn during June, as compared with June of 1937. Total payments for last month were \$304,833, as compared with only \$212,866 for June of 1937. The June upturn was not sufficient to overcome last year's lead, however, and the fiscal year closed near \$2,000,000 behind last year.

Many more petitions were checked last month than for the corresponding month of 1937, however, indicating that persons are planning to take advantage of the installment plan, a distinct advantage to hard-pressed taxpayers. The 10-payment plan was extended for but four months beyond the previously fixed deadline by the special session of the Legislature last spring. Previous sessions of the Legislature had extended it from year to year, but the deadline was now definitely set for August 20.

Appropriations Total \$2877

Among the appropriations voted by the city council Tuesday night were:

For the Chamber of Commerce, the first quarterly grant of \$2,000; for new hose for the fire department, \$35; for the purchase of a new Chevrolet pickup truck for the Municipal Water department, \$700, which includes a trade-in allowance of \$175 for an old coupe; for 50 cement meter boxes for the water department, \$92.70.

Dairy Cattle Gain in County Noted

The number of dairy cattle continues to increase in Los Angeles county, with dealers and dairymen here having purchased 1,922 during the month of June. This was an increase of 80 over the number purchased during the previous month.

More than half of the new cattle, or 1,020, were shipped from other states to this county. Idaho continues to lead the number shipped with 348 in June.

Gardena Anticipates New Postoffice

Gardena expects to see the construction of a new postoffice, costing approximately \$75,000, in the near future. A telegram received by Postmaster Ruth B. Sell of that city from Senator William G. McAdoo informed her that the Federal building has been approved. The Postoffice department must select and approve a site for the building.
