One little navy felt visored hat has a crown which is no more than quarter-moon shaped, thus allowing for any amount of curls on the top of the head. It is held on by a navy gros-grain back strap.

A miniature navy felt beret, usually stands on the right side of the head, while a ribbon is around the back of the head to keep it from falling.

Another model makes a ribbon on the top of the head, which makes a whole hat. And it is frequent.
