O'TOOLE IN SUPPORT OF STATE PENSIONS

Packard Oil Active

New construction in the oil field started during the past week amounted to \$38,700, according to the record of building permits. The new projects included:

Coline Gasoline Corporation of Los Angeles is building a cooling tower and foundation at Sepulveda and Madrona, \$3,000. S. R. Dunphy and H. H. Briggs of Fullerton are erecting a wooden derick at 2333 238th, \$5,000. Kenber Oil company of 1261 Cabrillo is installing two 600-barrel oil tanks at 2345 229th for \$200.

A. A. Douglas of Los Angeles has staked location and is building a derick at 2439 255th street. McDon Oil company of Los Angeles is throwing up a wooden derick at 2375 236th. Packard Oil company No. 4 of Los Angeles is erecting a wooden derick at 2427 235th and the No. 5 company is building another derick at 2454 233rd.

Well on Emerald McDonald and Burns of Torrance are building a eight-by-ten-foot corrugated iron building to be used as a testing laboratory for oil rigs at 2327 231st. The work will cost \$200. Howard Supply company of Los Angeles is laying a foundation for a 32 by 75-foot corrugated-iron temporary warehouse, costing \$300, at 23601 Narbonne. John R. Price of Newport Beach is a newcomer in the Torrance oil area and he has staked location for a derick at 3700 Emerald street near the Torrance-Redondo boundary.

The Bandini Petroleum company of Vernon, another new entrant in the local field, has taken out a derick permit for a venture on the south side of 237th street between Narbonne and Pennsylvania. Woolner Oil has finished its No. 4 on Pennsylvania near 229th for an estimated 150 barrels. Pennsylvania Oil has spudded a project at 236th and Pennsylvania. Fiat Oil has spudded No. 1 near 236th west of Pennsylvania and R.H.B.S. Oil is planning to drill. Election Oil is rigging to drill Airey No. 1 south and west of 235th and Pennsylvania. Sol Oil has a derick up over the old Phalen and Crawford Smith No. 1 well northwest of Carson and Flower streets and Rico Drilling is preparing to drill north and west of 236th and Pennsylvania. John Denbo and associates are readying to start well northeast of 236th and Pennsylvania.
