PARIS (U.P.)—This ostrih business is getting more serious by the hour. The latest outburst of plumes come in the form of feather-embroidered veils—yes, veils—designed by Mme. Suzanne Talbot.

Buyers and fashion writers gaped alike when they saw the plumed veils adorning Talbot winter hats. At first glance the tiny bits of colored ostrich down looked like ordinary embroidery as they formed intricate bandings for long veils, colorful dots on shorter veils or exotic eye "masks" on clouds of tulle veiling designed for evening coiffures.

The plume-embroidered veil was used to particular advantage in connection with a black velvet toque whose back was almost covered by a big blue velvet ribbon bow—a "porcelain" blue bordering on the shade of larkspur. The same blue reappeared in the microscopic plumes of ostrich down which were skillfully embroidered into the long enveloping black veil covering the toque and hanging in front to the shoulders. The plume embroidery concentrated itself at eye level, thus giving the appearance of an eye mask.

Veils without their feathers veered to circles or dots almost without exception in the Talbot hat salons. And coarse nets, thick enough to satisfy a fisherman, were used as often as the filmer varieties of veils. This thick "fillet" in violet coloring formed the back of an even deeper purple felt model topped by two violet wing feathers matching the fillet in color.

Pin dots of red and yellow added thickness to a dark green veil worn over a deep olive green felt with a triple brim high at the back. Black rings of assorted sizes were embroidered on the black velvet and white ostrich plumes. Brown and beige circles of chenille were scattered over a long brown veil hanging from a brown velvet, high crowned creation with a cameo at its peak and a chin strap of velvet to keep it in place.

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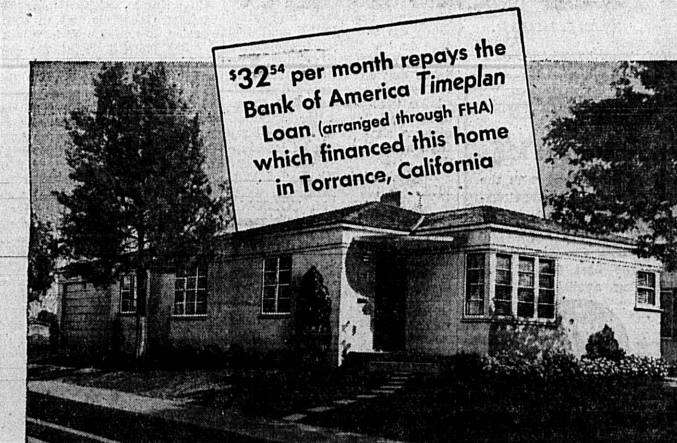
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
