ORDINANCE NO. 307
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA, CALLING AND PROVIDING FOR AND GIVING NOTICE OF A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA, ON THE 20TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1938, FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF SAID CITY PROPOSITIONS TO INCUR BONDED INDEBTEDNESS BY SAID CITY FOR CERTAIN MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENTS.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Torrance, California, did on the 25th day of August, 1938, by a vote of more than two-thirds of the members of said Council, adopt a resolution entitled "Resolution of the City Council of the City of Torrance, California, determining and declaring that the public interest and necessity demand the acquisition and construction by said city of certain municipal improvements, declaring the estimated costs thereof, and making findings in respect of said costs," which said resolution was duly signed and approved by the Mayor of said City and attested and certified by the City Clerk of said City; NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Torrance DOES ORDAIN as follows:

SECTION 1. That a special election be held and the same is hereby called to be held in the City of Torrance on the 20th day of September, 1938, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said City the propositions of incurring indebtedness and issuing bonds of said City therefor in amounts hereinafter set forth and for the objects and purposes set forth in said resolution and hereafter stated.

SECTION 2. That the objects and purposes for which said indebtednesses are proposed to be incurred and bonds issued therefor are as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 1: The acquisition and construction by the City of Torrance of a certain municipal improvement, to wit, certain park improvements, consisting of a municipal swimming pool and bath house, including all necessary equipment therefor, and a tunnel connecting certain portions of the park, and fence to enclose the park.

PROPOSITION NO. 2: The acquisition and construction by the City of Torrance of a certain municipal improvement, to wit, certain park and playground improvements, consisting of a municipal recreational building, tennis courts, a house for games and playground uses, and the acquisition of all furnishings and equipment necessary or convenient for said buildings.

PROPOSITION NO. 3: The acquisition and construction by the City of Torrance of a certain municipal improvement, to wit, a building for recreational and library purposes, including the acquisition of a site therefor, the acquisition of additional land therefor for playground and recreational purposes, the construction of tennis courts, and playgrounds, and the acquisition of all playground equipment and all equipment and furnishings necessary or convenient for said building, all in Walteria, Torrance, California.

SECTION 3. That the estimated cost of the proposed municipal improvement described in Proposition No. 1 of Section 2 hereof is the sum of \$53,998.00; that the amount of the principal of the indebtedness to be incurred therefor is the sum of \$35,000.00; that the maximum rate of interest to be paid on said indebtedness shall be five percent per annum, payable semiannually; that a portion of said cost will be paid by the United States of America, and the bonds herein proposed to be issued will be issued to provide that portion of the cost of the improvement which shall be paid by the City of Torrance.

That the estimated cost of the proposed municipal improvement described in Proposition No. 2 of Section 2 hereof is the sum of \$32,837.00; that the amount of the principal of the indebtedness to be incurred therefor is the sum of \$21,000.00; that the maximum rate of interest to be paid on said indebtedness shall be five percent per annum, payable semiannually; that a portion of said cost will be paid by the United States of America, and the bonds herein proposed to be issued will be issued to provide that portion of the cost of the improvement which shall be paid by the City of Torrance.

That the estimated cost of the proposed municipal improvement described in Proposition No. 3 of Section 2 hereof is the sum of \$12,185.00; that the amount of the principal of the indebtedness to be incurred therefor is the sum of \$8,000.00; that the maximum rate of interest to be paid on said indebtedness shall be five percent per annum, payable semiannually; that a portion of said cost will be paid by the United States of America, and the bonds herein proposed to be issued will be issued to provide that portion of the cost of the improvement which shall be paid by the City of Torrance.

SECTION 4. That the polls for said election shall be opened at six o'clock A. M. of the day of said election and shall remain open continuously from said time until seven o'clock P. M. of the same day when said polls shall be closed; provided, however, that if at said hour of closing there are any voters in any polling place or in line at the door thereof who are qualified to vote, and have not been able to do so since appearing, the polls thereat shall be kept open a sufficient time to enable them to vote, but no one who shall arrive at any polling place after seven o'clock P. M. of said day shall be entitled to vote although the polls may be open when he arrives.

That on the ballots to be used at said special election, in addition to the other matters required by law, there shall be printed substantially the following:

Mark crosses (X) on ballot ONLY WITH RUBBER STAMP; never with pen or pencil.

INSTRUCTIONS TO VOTERS

To vote on any question, proposition or constitutional amendment, stamp a cross (X) in the voting square after the word "Yes" or after the word "No." All marks, except the cross (X) are forbidden. All distinguishing marks or erasures are forbidden and make the ballot void. If you wrongly stamp, tear or deface this ballot, return it to the inspector of election and obtain another.

PROPOSITION NO. 1: Shall the City of Torrance incur a bonded indebtedness in the principal sum of \$35,000.00 for the acquisition and construction by the City of a certain municipal improvement, to wit, certain park improvements, consisting of a municipal swimming pool and bathhouse, including all necessary equipment therefor, and a tunnel connecting certain portions of the park, and fences to enclose the park (the estimated cost of such municipal improvement is \$53,998.00 and a portion of said cost will be paid by the United States of America)?

PROPOSITION NO. 2: Shall the City of Torrance incur a bonded indebtedness in the principal sum of \$21,000.00 for the acquisition and construction by the City of a certain municipal improvement, to wit, certain park and playground improvements, consisting of a municipal recreational building, tennis courts, a house for games and playground uses, and the acquisition of all furnishings and equipment necessary or convenient for said buildings (the estimated cost of such municipal improvement is \$32,837.00 and a portion of said cost will be paid by the United States of America)?

PROPOSITION NO. 3: Shall the City of Torrance incur a bonded indebtedness in the principal sum of \$8,000.00 for the acquisition and construction by the City of a certain municipal improvement, to wit, a building for recreational and library purposes, including the acquisition of a site therefor, the acquisition of additional land therefor for playground and recreational purposes, the construction of tennis courts and playgrounds, and the acquisition of all playground equipment and all equipment and furnishings necessary or convenient for said building, all in Walteria, Torrance, California (the estimated cost of such municipal improvement is \$12,185.00 and a portion of said cost will be paid by the United States of America)?

A cross (X) stamped in the voting square after the word "YES" shall be counted in favor of the adoption of the question or proposition. A cross (X) stamped in the voting square after the word "NO" shall be counted against the adoption of the question or proposition.

SECTION 5. That for the purpose of holding said election, there shall be and are hereby established thirteen election precincts, designated as hereinafter stated; that the polling places for the respective precincts shall be the places hereinafter designated, and that the persons hereinafter named, being competent and qualified electors and residents of said City and of their respective election precincts, are hereby appointed officers of election for their respective election precincts, and they shall hold said election and make return thereof in the manner provided by law.

SECTION 7. That the City Council of said City shall meet at their usual place of meeting in the City Hall on Monday, September 26, 1938, at 7:45 o'clock P. M. of said day and proceed to canvass the election returns and declare the result of said election.

SECTION 8. That the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance by a vote of more than two-thirds of all the members of the City Council of said City at a regular adjourned meeting of said Council, and its approval by the Mayor of said City, and shall cause said ordinance to be published once a week for two successive weeks in the TORRANCE HERALD, a weekly newspaper of general circulation printed and published in said City. No other notice of said election need be given.

SECTION 9. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.
