Old Time Grid Star Now On Herald Staff, Has Unusual Playing Record

These fall days when the thump of the pigskin, the thunderous roar of football crowds and trill of referees' whistles cut thru the stadium of the nation are days of joyous recollection for W. B. Wooldridge, The Herald's new circulation manager. His eyes light up, his shoulders broaden as he recalls his 15-year football career that was climaxed by his being the first All-American player from a university below the Mason-Dixon line to receive honorable mention by the late great Walter Camp, "father of modern football."

The other afternoon at The Herald office when the staff indulged in a football "bull-session" Wooldridge happened to mention that he played the game when the "Flying V" and other bone-crushing plays were the granddaddies of such evolutions as the single wing, unbalanced line and end around. A few questions about his grid experiences developed that:

Wooldridge played football at three famed institutions—Vanderbilt in Nashville, Tenn., where he attracted Camp's attention in 1896, the University of Virginia and University of Texas;

15 Years in One Position

He coached at Tulane University in New Orleans and at Poly high school in Los Angeles—the latter job being performed about 30 years ago.

He was captain of the U. of Texas team and for more than 35 years has received an honorary pass to all of the Lone Star state school's games.

He was captain of the Olympic Club team in San Francisco and played his last game with that squad against Stanford 32 years ago.

For 15 years he played one position—left halfback—and was (1) never a substitute, (2) never injured, and (3) never had to have "time out" taken for him.

Today, Wooldridge is a good many pounds under his football weight of 185 but he is in excellent physical condition. He is carrying his years as easily as he formerly carried the ball for his three Alma Maters.

Still Ardent Fan

Forty-two years ago his playing ability was recognized by Walter Camp, who had started picking his famed All-American teams in 1889. Incidentally, the Camp accolade was the highest honor a football player could aspire to until 1924. Since then the naming of the nation's outstanding mythical team has been

undertaken by scores of groups, hundreds of newspapers and all press associations. However, the All America Board of Football, organized after Camp's death, aspires to the Camp heritage.

Wooldridge apparently has an inexhaustible fund of football stories and he follows the game closely today. He intends to see all local games and as many of the college engagements as he can—when his duties on The Herald staff permit.

Gridsters Show Fine Spirit Here

Minor injuries—the usual crop of strained muscles, bumped and cut noggins, sprained ankles and Charley horses—are making their annual appearance among candidates for varsity and Class B football teams at Torrance high school but Coaches Robert Barr and Pete Zamperini have the mishaps well in hand. They expect to have nearly all of their "sick-list" players available when the Marine schedule gets under way in two weeks.

Meanwhile practice games and scrimmages with outside teams are rounding out the Tartar squads. Tomorrow the varsity goes to Jordan high for a practice game and Coach Barr has scheduled a scrimmage with Mt. Carmel high school on South Hoover street early next week. Barr was stressing aerial attack and defense this week as he drilled his varsity squad on passing plays.

The class B team lost a practice game with Leuzinger's lightweights last Friday afternoon 28 to 0. Tuesday the local lights scrimmaged with Redondo's Bees on the local field and Coach Zamperini declared that if his squad holds intact—he only has about 21 boys out—he hoped to enter the Marine league competition with a "fairly decent team." The Bees' first game is at Gardena Thursday afternoon, Oct. 20.

All grid prospects appear to be taking more than usual interest in the game this year. The outstanding reason for this revival of "school spirit" is believed to be the confidence the boys have in their coaches. Both Barr and Zamperini have demonstrated a corresponding increase
