After a year of chicken ranching in North Torrance, Elza R. Brown of 1901 West 182nd street declares he never wants to go back to being a "copper" on the Inglewood police force.

A patrolman's life in that city is not any more uncertain than in any other town but Brown, who served as an officer for seven years, much prefers improving his five-acre piece and raising a top-notch variety of fowls. He resigned from the Inglewood department Aug. 15, 1937, and two weeks after that date he and Mrs. Brown were surprised by an invasion of the entire force.

Brown's fellow officers and superiors presented him with a fine engraved ring, carrying the Inglewood city seal and the inscription "From the Gang to Elza R. Brown." This ring is one of his most cherished possessions today.
