

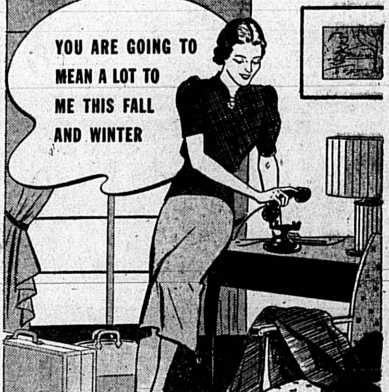

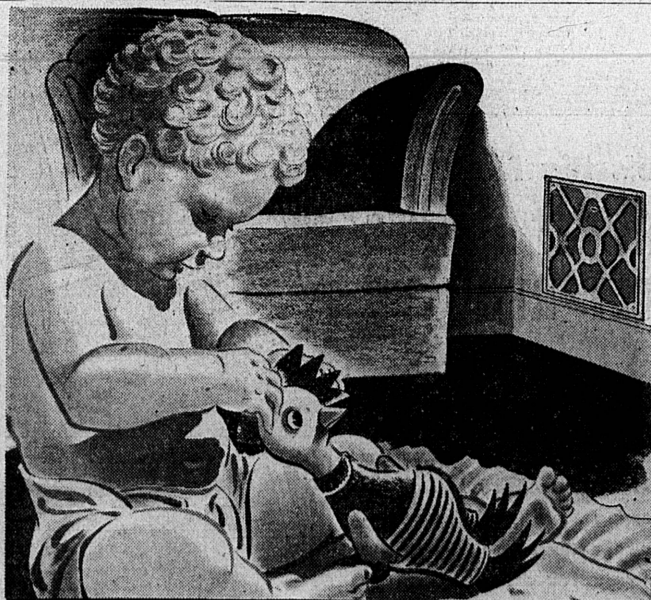

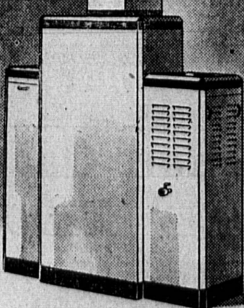

## State-Wide Groups Condemn Garrison Revenue Bond Act

"California can not afford a plunge into squandering money," the theme chosen by the State Association Against the Garrison Bond Act—Prop. No. 13 on the November ballot—has announced that civic groups throughout the state have enlisted in the campaign to defeat the proposal.

The official argument against the proposition in the Voters' Pamphlet, published by the Secretary of State's office, was released this week and condemned the act in the following language: "This dangerous act would abolish the time-tested principle which requires the vote of two-thirds of the people to approve public borrowings. It would permit the issuance of revenue bonds, in any amount, by a bare majority of those actually going to the polls. In reality, it would mean that any district, city or county could be plunged into debt by a small minority, as only a fraction of the registered vote usually turns out for a bond election."

Signing the argument against Prop. No. 13 were: Mrs. Robert J. Burdette, Pasadena, founder of the California Federation of Women's clubs; Glenn D. Willaman, Los Angeles, secretary of the California State Real Estate Association; and Lewis J. Foulke, Gazelle, Siskiyou County, president of the Common Property Taxpayers' Association.
