Economist Says Prop. 13 Is Dangerous

Condemnation of Proposition 3, the Revenue Bond Act, as unsound and dangerous," was closed this week by Professor dwin A. Cottrell, nationally nown economics expert of Stanton University and leading Caltornia advocate of public owneship.

ifornia advocate of public ownership.

"The issuance of revenue bonds is sound, but to require only a majority vote rather than a two-thirds vote is unsound and dangerous," Professor Cottrell said regarding the major provision of Number 13, which would abolish the Constitutional two-thirds vote safeguard on issuance of bonds, "The Act has over 12,000 words, is very ambiguous, uses terms not now found in the state law," Professor Cottrell pointed out, "and would probably lead to a tremendous amount of littgation. Although the Actspecifically states that the revenue bonds are a lien on the earnings of the utility only, there is no doubt but that the government in which the public utility commission is located would have to ascume any amount of defaulted bonds or other debt."
