Tartars Ending League Play Today; Battle Pirates on San Pedro Field

SHEER FIGHT GIVES TARTARS FIRST WIN OVER GAUCHOS SINCE 1934 CHAMPIONSHIP

Displaying a brand of football that had not been seen in a Torrance high school team since 1934 when the local school won its one and only legitimate Marine League championship, the 1938 Tartars ripped Narbonne high school's defense to shreds by sheer fight to win 19 to 12 last Friday afternoon.

It was the Tartars' first victory over the Lomita Gauchos since the '34 championship year, the second time the local school has won over Narbonne in 18 years' of competition and their second 1938 top score.

The Tartars kept the Gauchos almost completely bottled up during the entire game which was witnessed by the largest crowd ever to attend one of the Torrance-Lomita struggles. Torrance dominated all but the aerial phases of the game and the three touchdowns came as result of steady, determined drives that netted the Tartars 190 yards in scrimmage as compared to Narbonne's 84 and 11 downs to the Lomitas' four.

Touchdowns Divided
Marvin Goetsch, whose brilliant performance at left half thrilled the crowd of some 3,500 spectators all afternoon, opened the scoring attack in the first quarter by plunging 35 yards around right end to the Lomita goal line. Charles Grubb's kick hit the goal post to nullify the conversion.

In the third quarter, Henry Pupko, playing the best game he has shown to date, smashed the Gaucho line in three dives to finally collect Torrance's second score from the one-foot mark. Good for the extra point. The last Tartar touchdown was tallied by Algie Shimatsu—Perkin's kick was blocked.

Narbonne made its first score in the second quarter when Bill Mertz passed to Jack Sedan 10 yards for the six points. Mertz then tried another pass to Sedan for the extra point but the ball bobbed out of his hands.

Tartars Fight Hard
The second and last Gaucho score was accounted for on the first play opening the second half. Coach Robert Barr had held out his best regulars and Mertz scammed 45 yards thru a broken field to the Torrance goal line. Then Barr put in his first squad and once more the Tartars assumed command of the game.

The sheer fight of the local team was the outstanding factor of the whole engagement. Not once did the Tartars let down and they managed to keep the ball mostly in Narbonne's territory. Coach Barr had instructed his squad to play for breaks and the first quarter opened with a punting duel that saw-sawed
