

Easy Luncheons For School Days

Children who are near enough home to return there for lunch come in plenty hungry and in a rush to get back to play. Before classes are called again, this means that mothers have to plan the meals accordingly, that is, have lunch ready to eat as soon as the children arrive and have foods they like. The lunch must be nourishing, too, without the children being made conscious of the fact, for children dislike being reminded that certain foods are good for them.

Scalloped and casserole dishes such as hard cooked eggs with peas in cheese sauce are popular ones. This combination may be made to serve over toast by making the sauce medium thin and by cutting the eggs into slices. It may be baked as a casserole if the sauce is thicker; the eggs may be in halves or smaller pieces, the peas will be just peas, no matter what the style of the dish. Be sure to use the liquid from the can of peas in making the cheese sauce because it contains good food that ought to be used. The flavor of peas blends especially well with eggs and cheese sauce.

Instead of peas, lima beans or the mixed vegetables might be used. These vegetables are available in cans, which makes the preparation easy and their use gives variety to the simple meals. Similar easy dishes can be made with salmon or tuna. Add either fish to a creamed sauce and serve over toast, baked potato, rice or noodles. Some vegetable may be added to the mixture, or some sliced ripe olives, or pimiento.

Four Patients Enter Local Hospital

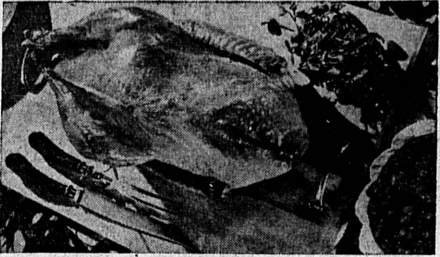

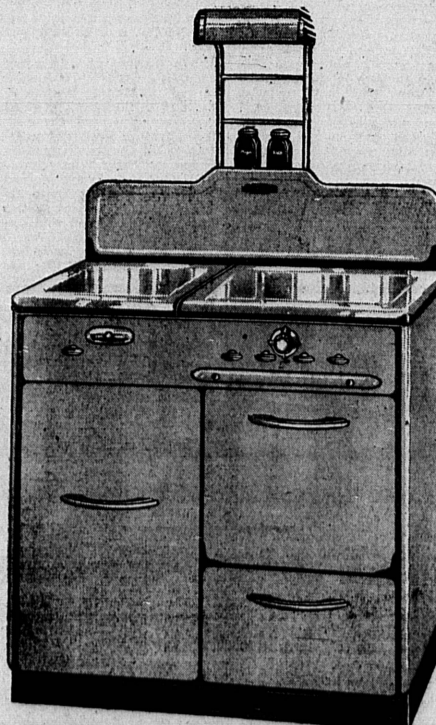

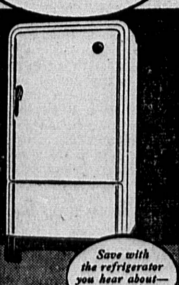
