**COUNTY VOTE FOUND UNUSUALLY HEAVY**

Los Angeles county cast approximately a 73 percent-vote in last week's general election, on the basis of semi-official returns.

This is considered a heavy vote when only state offices and state issues are involved. During presidential election years the percentage of ballots cast often exceeds 80 and sometimes 85 percent of the county's total registration.

Voters W. M. Kerr, under date of Nov. 4, four days before the election, asking that substitutions be made on election boards for the workers who attended the meeting. Kerr took no action on the request because, he said, no affidavits were presented to him in support of the charges.

"The Republican board members, according to our information, were told to refrain from offering the signature book to the voter until after the voter's name was checked on the register, and ample time given for challenges," Clark's letter stated. "This, it was pointedly brought out, was to delay voting."

"It is our belief that such a meeting, called by leaders of a political party to influence members of their party on the election boards to the detriment of an opposing political party constitutes such conduct on the part of these leaders as to render all Republican members of the election boards in the 18th Congressional district subject to removal. Affidavits will be presented."
