


Stanford Springs Surprise, Routs Dartmouth

Judge Gives Warning to Rowdies Spoiling Student Dances Here

"If any more cases of malicious mischief, wanton destruction in public property at the Civic Auditorium or disturbances of the peace in the vicinity of that municipal building on nights when the student dances are held there come before this court, I intend to make an example of the guilty defendants."

That's what City Judge Robert Lessing declared from the bench last Tuesday morning after hearing the case of a 17-year-old Los Angeles youth charged with the first two accusations mentioned by the magistrate. The boy was found guilty, after an inspection of the damage, of breaking, disfiguring and smashing a towel rack in the men's lavatory of the Auditorium last Friday night.

"I realize that there are only a few rowdies who cause our police officers to intervene at the dance but they will be curbed by citations to the Juvenile Hall if they cannot conduct themselves like most of the young people who attend the Friday night dances," Judge Lessing warned. The boy before him was found

guilty and on condition that he remain away from the student dances here for the next 30 days until he enters a C.C.C. camp—his case was taken off calendar. He was arrested by Special Officer Butterfield after the custodians of the Auditorium had noticed previous damage to the building and suspected the Los Angeles youth. The defendant admitted he had been drinking wine but refused to tell the court who gave it to him.

"Anyone who gives intoxicating liquor to boys does not deserve to be shielded," Judge Lessing told him. "I hope a clear case of such 'friends' will come before this court so that I can make the offender his just deserts."

"The student dances are provided by the Coordinating Council with the assistance of the city so that our young people may enjoy themselves at a small cost and stay at home. It is up to the boys and girls to assume some responsibility of good conduct and if they can't then this court is ready now to see to it that rowdism is halted."

Suspect Drunk of Starting Grass Fire Here Friday

Officers Percy Bennett and Tom Perkin suspected a Long Beach man found lying in a drunken condition near a grass fire at El Prado and Llewellyn street last Friday of causing the blaze but only charged him with intoxication for lack of evidence that he started the fire. Police and firemen expressed the opinion that the man may have accidentally started the blaze which was extinguished before any damage was done.

Firemen also answered an alarm Friday that called them to extinguish an automobile fire which was believed caused by a battery short-circuit in a machine owned by William Day of 2360 Sonoma.


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
