

GERALD GRUBB NAMED ON ALL-CITY TEAM

First Tartar to Make Honor Prep Eleven

Gerald Grubb, hard-hitting Tartar guard whose brilliant work on the court won recognition from all sports writers and coaches picking All-Marine League teams this year, became the first Torrance high school football player to make the All-City high school grid team yesterday.

He was the only Marine League player to win this honor and is now a likely candidate for the post of all mythical star teams—the All-Southern California football team. Last year Max Coast, Tartar quarterback, was named on the third All-City team.

Jack Seden of Narbonne was named on the All-City second team for his work as a wingman for the Gauchos and Shelby Deaderick of Narbonne also made the second string as a guard. Roy Provence of San Pedro was selected for the All-City third team to fill a tackle berth as were two Rils players, Benny Leone, center, and Everett Ridgely, half.

Gerald and his brother, Charles, will be seen in action tomorrow afternoon when the Tartars play the Rils Vikings in a playoff game for the minor Los Angeles city championship on the local high school field. The Brothers Grubb, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Grubb of 1905 Acacia, have been the major bulwark in the Tartar line all season and their blocking and line plunging have been responsible for many of the breaks that put the Torrance team into the Marine League championship.

Gerald and Charles were born in Ellendale, North Dakota, but were brought here by their parents when they were youngsters and received all of their schooling to date in local schools. Gerald, who is 18, is scheduled to graduate in February with the Winter class of 1939. Charles, who will be 17 soon, is a junior in high school. Gerald has made no plans for his activities when he graduates.

To Receive Award
 In announcing the All-City honors, the Southern California Board of Football and the Helms Foundation, declared that "if all of the men selected for the first team could be brought together to play on the same team you would see the finest group of high school football players in uniform today. Every man on the team is an artist at his position."

Gerald Grubb and his All-City teammates will receive a suitable award from the Helms Athletic Foundation.

GERALD GRUBB IS UNANIMOUS CHOICE; LEWELLEN PICKS 9

Grid fans who followed the fortunes of Torrance, Narbonne, Gardena, Banning and San Pedro high schools' variety elevens during the past grid season had a choice of five "All-Marine League" teams to study and ponder this week as the coaches and sports writers proclaimed their selections for that mythical super squad. The All-Marine that will receive widest recognition is that of the All-Southern California Board of Football's choice.

But each of the others, by Coach Robert Barr of the local Tartar squad, Robert Lewellen, The Herald's ace sports fan; Marine League coaches and Joe Goss, San Pedro sports writer, will have their following so The Herald prints them all. Most controversial of the mythical elevens is the Marine League coaches' selection which Sports writer Goss blasted from it to end and then selected his own stellar squad.

Goss' objections were based on the fact that Banning's coach was responsible for the selections, managed to place five of his Pilots in that All-Marine while Torrance, which won the championship with Narbonne, only got Gerald Grubb and Akige Shimatsu in the honor lineup. Goss claimed that positions were shuffled about to juggle Banning players into the lineup.

Overcomes Handicap
 Be that as it may, these points stand out in a study of all five All-Marines:
 That Seden (Narbonne), Gerald Grubb (Torrance), Provence (San Pedro) and Merz (Narbonne) are unanimous choices for their particular berths.
 That Deaderick (Banning), Mardesch (San Pedro) and Burns (Gardena) received four

out of the five nominations;
 That Ray Richhart, Torrance center, and Marvin Goettsch, Torrance left half, were tabbed in three of the star squads;
 That Coach Robert Barr showed his loyalty to his Tartars by naming four of them—Gerald Grubb, Richhart, Goettsch, and Shimatsu—on his All-Marine.

In selecting his annual honor squad, Robert Lewellen of The Herald staff was greatly handicapped this year because he was unable to attend any of the games. However, Lewellen kept in close contact with the various teams thru his acquaintance with the players and by following the various newspaper accounts of the games.

The fact that he managed to have nine of his 11 selections "approved" by the All-S.C. Board is indicative of his ability to spot the outstanding players—even tho he did not see any of them in action. Lewellen has been picking his own All-Marines since the close of the 1934 season. Here's how he has scored: 1934—eight of his first team nominations were confirmed. 1935—nine out of 11. 1936—seven out of 11. 1937—seven out of 11. 1938—nine out of 11.
