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H. S. Ag Class On Field Trip to Soil Project

The advanced agriculture class of Torrance high school is soil conservation conscious.

Last week the members journeyed to La Habra, where Mr. Foreyette of the Soil Conservation Service guided them over projects demonstrating the various methods of preventing soil erosion. If the farmers on the north slope of the Palos Verdes Hills had had the benefit of these demonstrations they might still have had some valuable top soil to cultivate.

The boys and their instructor Harry H. Stone, saw orchards planted on contour terraces around hills—not rows straight up and down to become muddy rivers in each rain. They saw the terraces on gently sloping hay land which permitted most of the rain water to soak in, and the excess to slowly run off—but not run off with the fertile top soil.

They saw check dams of concrete and earth fill dams to halt progress of gully erosion. The class was interested in permanent Bermuda grass cover crops in citrus orchards sprinkled as a lawn, these orchards producing the highest quality fruit in the packing house.

Fields which the conservation service considered too steep to cultivate were returned to permanent pasture, and the number of head regulated to provide natural re-seeding of pasture grasses.

The practical value of this work was emphasized when the local group recalled the condition of Highway 101 after heavy rains, particularly last March. If some of the money required for street rehabilitation by the county and the repair of damage to homes and gardens and fields

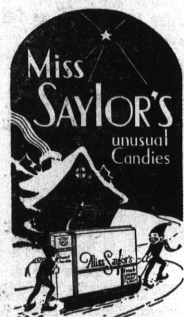

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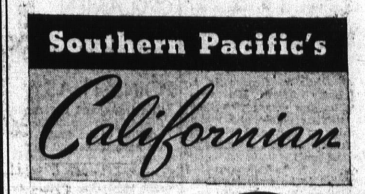
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
