HAUGE TOLD TAX PROBLEM

A delegation representing taxpayers in the Alondra Park assessment district called on Oscar Hauge, newly-appointed supervisor for this district, yesterday to acquaint him with the Alondra Park problem and seek his cooperation in obtaining tax relief.

Selection of a committee of property owners in the Alondra Park acquisition and improvement district to discuss a settlement with the holders of the outstanding bonds was agreed upon at the conference.

Representing the various sections of the assessment district were Mayor William H. Tolson of this city, Mayor Wayne A. Bogart of Gardena, Judge Frank Carroll and Secretary Pat MacDaniel of Gardena, and Mayor Colfax Bell and City Attorney Frank Perry of Redondo Beach.

Taxpayers of the park district are paying general taxes but are refusing to pay assessments made under the Mattoon Act which created the district in 1927, providing for a park of 315 acres on the north side of Redondo Beach boulevard and adjacent to the city of Gardena, Los Angeles County, Torrance and Redondo Beach. This year the Board of Supervisors discontinued the annual appropriation made for tax relief in the district and, under pyramiding assessments provided by the Mattoon Act, the tax burden means that several property owners will lose their holdings.

Assessed valuation in the district is \$4,750,000, with annual payment due on the principal, \$51,000. When the county first came to the aid of taxpayers a few years ago there was a 33 1/2 percent delinquency, which resulted in a lot of "sour bonds." In 1938 the delinquency was reduced to 18 percent, leaving a balance due of \$663,000 bearing seven percent interest. In five years of county aid the Supervisors appropriated a total of \$448,000. This year there is due \$97,645 to be paid on interest and retirement of bonds.
