Check Out 500 Players
Winning a berth on an All-Southern California team is no easy feat but Gerald's brilliant performances as a guard on the 1938 Tartar team were consistent and thus received recognition of all grid experts who saw him in action.

In addition to receiving certificates for his placement on the All-Marine, All-City and All-S.C. squads, Gerald was also presented with a gold plaque by the Helms Athletic Foundation, sponsor of the Southern California honor. That Foundation carefully checked and considered the records of more than 500 outstanding S.C. junior college and high school football players to determine the final ratings.

Gerald, his father and his coach, Robert Barr, were guests at the Tuesday night function of the Torrance Kiwanis club which has always taken a deep interest in high school activities. Coach Barr's excellent work during the past season did not go unnoticed by the Foundation as he was mentioned as the second best Los Angeles City high school coach this year—the Eagle Rock mentor being given first place.

Gerald Grubb has not yet thru with prep football. He will be seen in action on the night of Dec. 30 at the L. A. Coliseum when the best players in Southern California will meet an all-star team from Chicago. He is working out daily with the All-S.C. team at Loyola high school. In return for his year-end performance, Gerald will see the Rose Bowl game, be a guest of a large motion picture studio and at a big banquet given by a Los Angeles newspaper.

Sports Heights of '38 Stormed By 3 Men, Horse and Ball Club

NEW YORK, Dec. 22 (U.P.)—Up to the peaks of sports in 1938 marched three men, a horse and a baseball team. It was a year for stand-out performers, probably the greatest year for individual stars since the golden days of Dempsey, Ruth, Jones and Tilden.

General performance was excellent in all sports but the glory—and in all cases—the gold went to:

Henry Armstrong, only man to hold three world boxing titles at the same time.

Sammy Sneed, biggest money winner of the year among golf professionals and a man whose sirupy swing may bring him eventual recognition as a greater golfer than the great Bob Jones.

Seabiscuit, a stout-hearted champion of the tracks who climaxed a sparkling season by defeating War Admiral in a heart-stopping match race at Pimlico.

Don Budge, who made a grand slam of all the major tennis titles in the world, dominated America's successful defense of the Davis Cup and then cashed in his chips for \$75,000 to open the new year as a professional.

The New York Yankees, winners of the American League pennant and victors in four straight games over the Chicago Cubs in the World Series—only team ever to win three consecutive world championships.

Except for Budge, who campaigned through 1938 as an amateur, it was a year for the money players, for the professionals who make a business of games.
