## Impressive Christmas Musical Pageant Praised

Speeches, pageantry and Christmas caroling blended to make a most unusually fine dedication program last Friday night when the new \$103,700 Torrance high school assembly hall was formally presented by Lawrence L. Larrabee, president of the Los Angeles City board of education, to the local faculty and student body.

More than 700 attended the event which was featured by a Christmas pageant that, for sheer beauty of stage setting, costuming and a Capella singing, surpassed anything ever presented here. All credit for this splendid presentation must go to Mrs. Marjorie Eischen Cooke.

The new auditorium provided a delightful setting for the entertainment and Mrs. Cooke took full advantage of the lighting, stage and professional facilities to present an Early English Yuletide festival that was notable in conception and presentation of traditional Christmas music. The student choral groups attained a symphonic tonal quality that was inspiring.

Honor Principal Elson Mrs. Florence Haffner's orchestra provided an instrumental interlude that was in keeping with the whole production and

Miss Ada Chase's art direction was evident in the stage setting and costuming. That the audience was deeply moved by the student presentation was evident from the whole-hearted manner in which all joined in singing the ancient Adeste Fideles carol under the direction of Mrs. Haffner at the close of the program.

Mrs. Ruth Woodcock, president of the Torrance high school P.T.A., opened the dedication event with a short business meeting during which Principal Thomas Elson was genuinely surprised by the presentation of a life membership P.T.A. award. Charles B. Moore, assistant superintendent of schools, speaking on "Democracy in Our School System," gave a scholarly address, emphasizing that education is not static but a living, progressive force for the enlightenment of all people.

Principal Elson introduced the honor guests present and these included a number of school board officials among them Roy Becker and John F. Dalton, members of the board; A. S. Nibbelker, Jr., business manager; Wesley Bager, architect of the beautiful new building; Merle Helbach, principal of the Torrance Elementary school, and other local residents.

College Next Visiting Kersey, superintendent of schools, spoke briefly and Mayor William H. Tolson during his short talk pointed out that the next step that Torrance should take in its march toward civic completeness should be the acquisition of a junior college.

Within the next few weeks the orchestra seats will be installed in the assembly hall and the entire structure will be complete in time for the first graduation exercises to be held there. The Winter class of 1939 will have the honor of being the first group to receive diplomas in the new building in February. Temporary seats were used at the dedication last Friday evening.

Perhaps the most notable feature of the hall is its excellent acoustics. The design of the walls and ceiling permit every one on the audience floor to hear the school hues of red and gray, reduced to a delightful low intensity, is also noteworthy. The lighting facilities permit almost unlimited range for any type of a stage presentation.
