Germany Seeks **Faster Turnout** of Apprentices

BERLIN (U.P.)-To help meet BERLIN U.F.)—To nelp meet Germany's labor shortage, 4,000 labor committees embracing about 55,000 factory executives and workers have been ordered to study means of reducing periods of apprenticeship at least to three years.

It is concluded that the educational efforts of the Workers' Front and the Hiller Youth, together with general intensification of factory activity make such a reduction possible.

Other questions the committees are to deal with this winter are "Simplifying Working Processes," "Raising Professional Standards of Accomplishment," "Health in Factories," "Care of the Factory Working-Woman." Germany's labor shortage, 4,000
