GRUBB IN L. A.-CHICAGO PREP GAME AT COLISEUM FRIDAY

Three Marines In Night Battle

Eighty thousand grid fans are expected to file into the Los Angeles Coliseum tomorrow (Friday) night to witness the game between the All-Stars of Los Angeles city high schools and 24 outstanding prep grid players from Chicago's high schools.

Among those 80,000 will be a representative delegation of Torrance football fans who will be there to watch Gerald Grubb, stellar Tartar guard, in action with the young Angelenos. Gerald, All-Marine, All-City and third string All-Southern California player, is a guard on the L. A. All-Stars' first team.

Also in the stands will be a contingent from Lomita, eager to see Jack Seiden, Narbonne end, who is on the first All-Star team, and Wilmington will have a host of fans present to watch Shelby Dedrick, Banning guard. Grubb, Seiden and Dedrick are the only Marine League players chosen for the 25-man L. A. team.

Guests at Rose Bowl

The Friday night game is being played as a benefit for the P.T.A. Milk Fund and the tickets are the lowest priced for any Coliseum game—25 cents for students, 50 cents for adults with 50-year stripe seats going for \$1.

The Chicago contingent of prep stars arrived in Los Angeles yesterday. The squad outweighs the Southland gridgers and nearly every high school boy from the Windy City is older than the local players. Chicago has a 21-year limit while the L. A. City age ban clamps down when gridgers reach 19.

All members of the two competing squads will attend the Rose bowl game Jan. 2 between U.S.C. and Duke University and will also be guests at a post-game banquet and tour of motion-picture studios.

Gerald Grubb has been working out daily with the L. A. All-Stars at Loyola high school and is in the pink of condition.

Re-Surfacing Will Continue

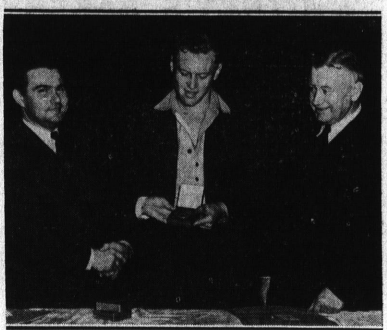
