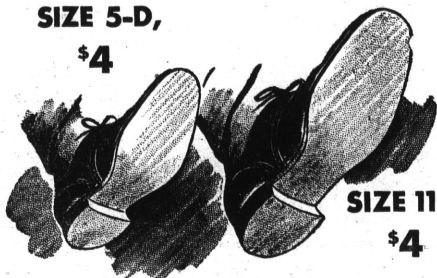

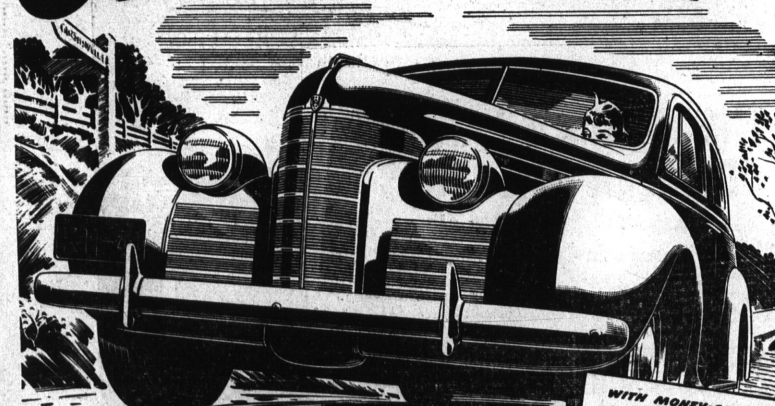

### Reaves Active in Legislature

Fred Reaves, Assemblyman from this district, is the co-author of Assembly Bill No. 23 which would make it a crime to destroy agricultural products suitable for human consumption. Another measure sponsored by Reaves at the 53rd Legislative Session is a bill to prohibit the issue of deputy badges to other than full paid members of police, fire, or sheriff staffs. This measure, he says, would do away with the evil of issuing thousands of complimentary police badges in this state.

Reaves is working with the Democratic majority in the Assembly. He was a member of the committee that escorted Tom Mooney from San Quentin to the Assembly Chambers last Saturday.

Tuesday Reaves introduced a bill calling for an appropriation of \$100,000 for erection of a new governor's mansion in Sacramento. He said he would amend it later to provide that the structure be located in Capitol Park. Monday the assemblyman presented three bills. One calls for abolishment of the California Nautical school, another would set up a voluntary mediation committee for settlement of labor disputes and the third provides for formation of park districts within two miles of the beach in the Palos Verdes Estates.
