"Love" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon on Sunday in all churches of Christ, Scientist. The Golden Text is from the Psalms: "How excellent is thy lovingkindness, O God; therefore the children of men put their trust under the shadow of thy wings."

One of the Bible selections in the Lesson-Sermon presents the verse from Deuteronomy: "Know therefore that the LORD thy God, he is God, the faithful God, who keepeth covenant and mercy with them that love him and keep his commandments to a thousand generations." These verses from John's first epistle are also included: "Beloved, let us love one another; for love is of God; and every one that loveth is born of God, and knoweth God. He that loveth not knoweth not God; for God is love. . . . And we have known and believed the love that God hath to us, God is love; and he that dwelleth in love dwelleth in God, and God is in him."

A passage from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, states: "The starting-point of divine Science is that God, Spirit, is All-in-all; that there is no other might or mind;—that God is Love, and therefore life is divine Principle."

Neatly Darned Kerchief of Napoleon on Exhibit

James J. Byrnes, Long-Time National Supply Officer, Expires

A long life of service—26 years of it spent as purchasing agent for the National Supply company—came to an end early yesterday morning when James J. Byrnes succumbed at his home, 2028 Carson street.

Mr. Byrnes had been in poor health for many months. He retired as an officer of the National Supply company last October. Few men here had the wide acquaintance he had. As one of the pioneer residents of the community—he came to Torrance when the Union Tool company moved its plant here in 1913—he took a keen interest in civic affairs altho he never sought public office.

His fellow-workers at the local industrial plant regarded him as a man of sterling character, always willing to assist in many kindly acts and one who was outstanding for his love of his home.

Funeral is Friday

Mr. Byrnes was born in Manchester, England, and came to this country as a young man. Equipped with a good education, he found his niche in the industrial work and several years ago was honored by the Los Angeles Purchasing Agents' association by being elected president.

He is survived by his devoted wife, Mrs. Nello C. Byrnes; a daughter, Elizabeth, and a son, Edward. The funeral service will be held tomorrow (Friday) afternoon at 1 o'clock at the Stone and Myers chapel, R. W. Keefe, C. S., a personal friend and fellow-worker, will conduct the Christian Science service. Norman Soren Wright, a noted organist-composer who is a close friend of the Byrnes family, will have charge of the music. Cremation will follow at Inglewood Crematory.
