All Torrance residents interested in any form of dramatic art—acting, directing, writing, make-up, costuming or stage design—are invited to attend a meeting to be held next Monday night, Feb. 20, at 8 o'clock in the city council chamber.

At that time, the proposed Torrance Community Players will be launched and a program of activities adopted. The meeting is expected to show those backing the amateur dramatics just how many local residents are desirous of participating in such a project.

An advisory council is to be chosen to outline the Players' productions and promotion. This session is not to be a "mass meeting" but to be held only for those who are interested in amateur theatricals.

City Councilman Tom McGuire will preside as he did at the meeting held at the Chamber of Commerce Feb. 6 when the dramatic society was enthusiastically approved by 27 representatives of some 17 city organizations.
