

N. P. B. W. Group Hears Inspiring Address on International Relations

San Pedro 'Y' Secretary Asks for Friendship at Home

With Florence H. Welch as chairman, assisted by Josephine Hughes and Dorothy Jensen, the international relations committee of the National Business and Professional Women of Torrance Monday night presented one of the most satisfying programs the group has had in many months.

An excellent dinner was served by the St. Cecilia Guild at St. Andrew's Episcopal guild hall. Floral decorations in red, white and blue, reminded guests of the birthday of this country's Revolutionary War leader and the nation's first president, George Washington. Tiny flags of all nations served as favors and carried out the international theme.

Lewis Dreyer, popular baritone, formerly of Torrance, sang several delightful numbers, accompanied by Madame Teala Billini, and the club indulged in its favorite pastime of community singing.

Leonard R. Hall, executive secretary of the Y.M.C.A., at San Pedro, was the speaker. Only a man of shrewd observation, coupled with sympathetic understanding, could have gathered, in ten years of experience in the Orient, the fund of first-hand knowledge of the real people of China and Japan that was poured out upon a rapt group Monday night. Hall used no trite phrases that lend themselves to repeated quotation, no flag-waving oratory to press home his points.

He did leave with his audience the thought that international relations, especially in California, begin at home where daily opportunities for kind understanding and friendship with people of other races are offered.

Upon the militaristic leaders of foreign lands, Hall placed the onus for the turmoil of today. For the peace-inclined people of those lands, he asked sympathy and understanding.
