Parent Teachers Hear Talk on Individual Rights

"The Rights and Responsibilities of the Individual" was the subject discussed by Dr. Gertrude Laws, chief of the bureau of Parent Education in the state of California at the Tenth District Parent Teachers meeting held in Huntington Park last Thursday.

Dr. Laws said in part, "Too much has been said of the rights of individuals. Maturity is necessary to responsibility. We as parents and teachers sometimes expect children to think in proportion to the size of clothes they wear rather than to the degree of maturity they possess."

"Maturity of mind is not always equal to the years we have lived. Parents and teachers too frequently are unable to see where they look, or hear where they listen. We owe our individuality to others and are not individuals except in our relation to others."

"Too much time is spent in evading responsibility which cannot be evaded. Responsibility should make us react with a feeling of buoyancy and confidence. Children must be taught to look upon responsibility as an opportunity."

"Do we as parents have a tendency to value things according to rarity or abundance? Our values determine the way we treat it. How do you value your children? Let us sell education at home and in school based upon a search for truth and remember always that the four major threats to each child are individuals in ignorance, malice, delusion and misinformation."

A musical treat is in store for residents of this city, when Compton Junior College symphony orchestra, under the direction of Aldor J. Belprez, and the A Cappella choir, directed by D. S. Jones, will be presented in concert in the Torrance high school assembly hall, March 16 at 8 o'clock.

The versatility and technical abilities of Compton's instrumental department is well known and during the last school year the instrumental department has made 73 appearances. In 32 of these concerts the orchestra participated. Special recognition was given the orchestra when nine members of the group were chosen to take part in the All-California symphony orchestra concert to be given at Santa Barbara State College under the direction of the famous composer and conductor, Henry Elschen.

Makes Many Appearances
The purpose of the A Cappella choir is to acquaint students and listeners with the cultural values of organized group singing and to introduce the singers to the repertoire of the secular choirs.

This group has appeared before many women's clubs and service organizations in the surrounding communities during the past year and took part in the California Junior College Music Festival. Choirs of the participating schools joined in a trans-Pacific broadcast released over 160 United States radio stations.

The Compton Junior College orchestra and choir are here each year at the Hermosa Beach auditorium under the sponsorship of Hermosa Beach Rotarians. Local residents, who have attended the concerts look forward to their appearance in this city. The concert here is sponsored by the High School Parent Teachers Association and ticket sales are being handled by high school students.


POST NUPTIAL SHOWER AT BABCOCK HOME


