

Semi-Pro Ball Tourney Deal in Progress

C. C. Wants
State Playoff
At City Park

Certain of obtaining the 1939 Semi-Pro Baseball Tournament here in July, the Chamber of Commerce is now conducting negotiations with the National Semi-Pro Baseball Congress at Wichita, Kansas, relative to three important points regarding the event. These are:

1—The amount of first prize money; 2—a Northern California tournament, and 3—location of the play-off between Northern and Southern California winners for the state championship.

Regarding the prize money, the Chamber, which has applied for the state franchise to hold the tournament among 16 to 24 outstanding semi-pro teams at the city park diamond, may underwrite the sum of \$500 if these promoting the proposed Northern California tourney will put up the same amount for their winner.

Want Play-Off Here

However, no definite commitment has been given as to any size of a first place award. The Chamber, it was decided at a meeting of President Alden W. Smith, Sam Levy, George Peckham, City Councilmen Tom McGuire and James Hitchcock, Dale Riley, Secretary L. J. Gilmeister and Michael Strasser of The Herald, is appreciable toward the Northern California tournament for determining the best team in that sector.

But the local men want the final play-off to be held here, preferably immediately after the Southern California tournament at the city park diamond. Some consideration is being given to installing additional lights at the ball park in event night games are found necessary but there is nothing definite to report on that score as yet.

Disease Lurks
In Japanese
Shaving Brushes

Dr. J. L. Pomeroy, county health officer, reports that the County Health Department laboratory has found anthrax organisms on one of the suspected shaving brushes which has been turned in, thus verifying the report sent out from the Federal government thru the State Department of Public Health.

The public should remember that the mark on these brushes is "Imperial sterilized Japan No. 32", and anyone who has in his possession such a brush is advised to destroy it by burning immediately. Ordinary methods of disinfection will not kill anthrax germs.
