Inter-City Bus Service Data Being Compiled

Feasibility of establishing a municipally-operated bus service between Torrance, Gardena and Los Angeles was discussed at a joint meeting of Gardena and Torrance city officials and civic leaders here last Friday morning at the city hall with Mayor William H. Tolson acting as chairman.

The problem was informally discussed and it was apparent to those present that before any definite decision could be made, more facts and figures would be required. Secretary L. J. Gilmeister of Commerce and Secretary Pat MacDonnell of the Gardena chamber were

requested to gather as much data as possible and report back to the general committee at an early date.

Mayor Tolson expressed the opinion that the bus line should serve Walteria, Lomita, Torrance, Gardena and connect with the Los Angeles buses at

rance, Gardena and connect with the Los Anglees buses at Figueroa and Manchester avenues. Tolson stated that he favored light buses capable of carrying 14 to 20 passengers and said he hoped that a 30-minute service could be given. Others at the meeting expressed approval of the proposal providing the system could be operated without loss after the first year.

As the plan of establishing bus service to Los Angeles originated with Gardena, committee members from that city lead the discussion at the joint meeting. Benefits to be derived as well as problems to be mode, the first decisions to be made, the plant of the committee of the
