## ZAMPERINI BREEZES TO TWO WINS

If track fans harbored any doubt that Louis Zamperini is going to have the best season of his running career this spring, and summer, those misapprehensions were routed last Saturday when the Torrance flash breezed in for victory in the mile and half-mile against California at Berkeley.

Zamperini defeated Cecil Cole, his formidable California rival, by more than 35 yards in the mile run. His time was 4:52.2. Then he came back to beat two Bears in a 1:55.9 half-mile. In both races, the Trojan speedster was given little competition and track experts agreed that he had to look beyond the Pacific Coast for opposition that will really test his ability this season.

Louie is stronger than ever and his weight (170) is more than he has ever tipped the scales. The one-mile duel between Zamperini and Cole had been touted as the feature of the meet, which U.S.C. won, 81 to 50. But the 12,000 fans attracted to the Coliseum were somewhat disappointed for two reasons: (1) the track was slow and (2) Cole was not the competition he had been reported.

### Lets Cole Lead

The mile pace was set by Cole. After Holland of California and Stagg of U.S.C. had blazed the way for 400 yards, Cole jumped out ahead as the first lap ended out in 63 seconds. Stagg dropped out when abreast of Cole at 2:07 for the half, and as they rounded the next turn, Zamperini moved up from well back to within two yards of his blue-shirted foe.

There Louie stayed, playing with Cole and letting the Californian determine the pace of the race. Cole whizzed along as fast as he could but his time of 3:12 for the three laps was not up to expectations.

Zamperini made no move until 200 yards from home. He drew abreast of Cole but the Berkeley man was determined. He held on gamely, refusing to give up the lead until they straightened out into the home stretch. At this point Zamperini hopped onto his bicycle and zoomed away from Cole as though the latter had been shot. Cole slowed down to a dog trot and was opposite the broad jump pit when Louie crossed the line.

Zamperini used the same tactics later to win the 880, making no effort to win until he hit the home stretch. Then there was no holding him.

Susumi Ishikawa, great Japanese track athlete holds ten school records to date, and Gerald McDonald, Teruza Hata and Leo Stecker are the last to get their names on the big book, while Louis Zamperini with his school record in the mile run, the World's mark for high school athletes.

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
