business of \$2,500,000.

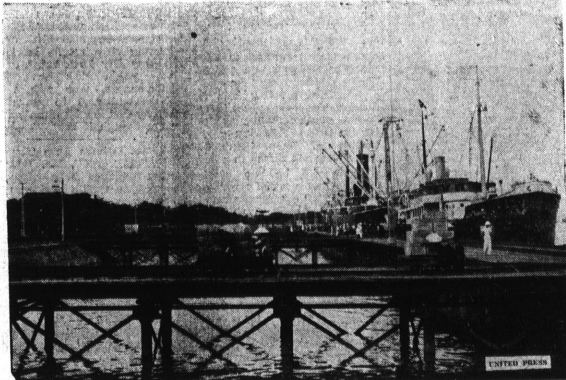
Basing their estimates on di-

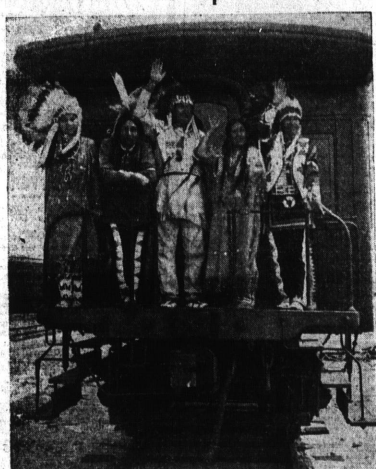
Preview of the new Union Sta-

ORDINANCE NO. 8343
(New Series)

An ordinance amending Section 17 of Ordinance No. 789 (New Series).

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles do hereby enact as follows:

Section 1. Section 17 of Ordinance No. 789 (New Series), entitled "An Ordinance granting to the Union Oil Company of California, a corporation, a franchise to lay, maintain and operate a pipe line system for the transportation and distribution of oil and gas and to maintain telephone and telegraph lines in connection therewith in, under, along and across certain public highways in the County of Los Angeles," adopted October 30, 1922, is hereby amended to read:

Section 17. It shall be the duty of the grantee to file with the Clerk of the said Board of Supervisors on or before the 21st day of August of each year and every year a statement verified by the oath of the manager or presiding officer of said grantee, showing in detail the total gross receipts and gross earnings collected and received by said grantee for the twelve months' period ending June 30th next preceding such statement or for the portion of a year ending on such June 30th, from the transportation of oil and gas through any part of the system for the construction and operation of which this franchise is granted, and within ten days after the time for filing the aforesaid statement it shall be the duty of said grantee to pay to the County Treasurer of the County of Los Angeles in lawful money of the United States, the aggregate sum of the said two percent of the gross annual receipts arising from the use, operation or possession of this franchise, and if payment of any sum so required to be paid by the grantee under the terms of this franchise is not made the Board of Supervisors may bring suit to collect the amount which in their judgment is due and owing thereunder from the grantee to the County.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after the date of its adoption, and prior to the expiration of fifteen days from the passage hereof shall be published for at least one week in Torrance Herald, a newspaper printed and published in the County of Los Angeles, State of California, together with the names of the members of the Board of Supervisors voting for and against the same.

Boneless Fish Caught: Scientists Are Amazed

EAST LONDON, South Africa (U.P.)—A fish caught 40 fathoms beneath the sea here should have been dead 50,000,000 years ago.

It belonged to the species *Crossopterygii*, which scientists had believed extinct. Of a brilliant steel blue color, the fish was 5 feet long and weighed 127 pounds. It had no bones, but a cartilage—a hard but pliant substance—and its fins and scales were of the primitive type.

Apparently its ancestors were common 100,000,000 years ago—the golden age for the *Crossopterygii*. But what one of the species is doing alive today is a riddle for the scientists to solve.
