MOTHER CLUB QUEST AT MAY DAY PARTY

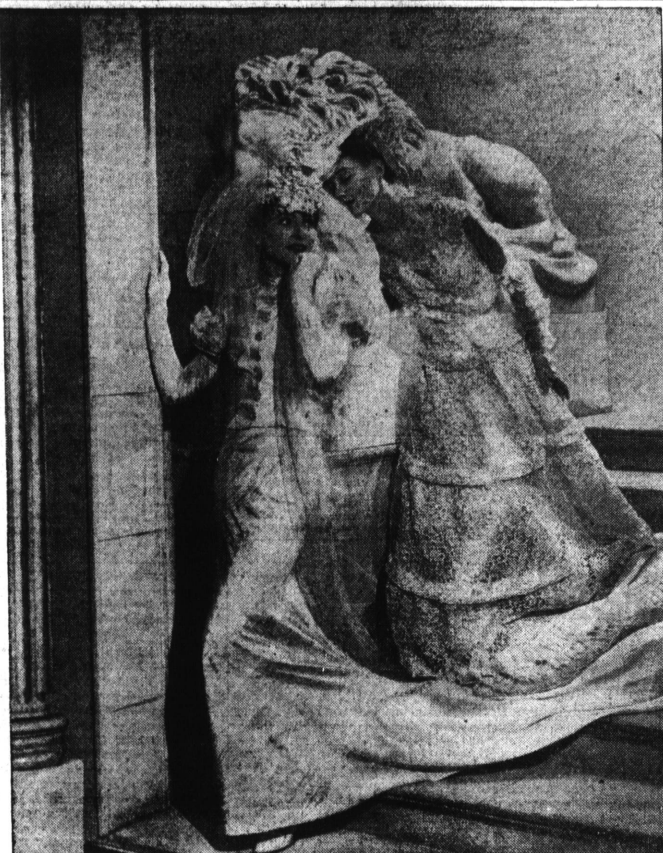
