"Adam and Fallen Man" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon on Sunday in all Churches of Christ, Scientist. This verse from 1 Corinthians is the Golden Text: "As in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive."

The Lesson-Sermon includes also these passages from Genesis: "And God said, Let there be a firmament in the midst of the waters, and let it divide the waters from the waters. . . . And God saw every thing that he had made, and behold, it was very good. . . . Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all the host of them. . . . But there went up a mist from the earth, and watered the whole face of the ground. And the LORD God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul."

Among the passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy, are the statements: "The second chapter of Genesis contains a statement of this material view of God and the universe, a statement which is the exact opposite of scientific truth as before recorded."

"The science of the first record proves the falsity of the second. . . . The first record assigns all might and government to God, and endows man with God's perfection and power. . . . Existence, separate from divinity, Science explains as impossible."

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
