to Harbor City Equipment is being removed from the Torrance relief cannery and being moved to the old plant of the Tornato Packing corpora-tion at 1280 West 253rd street, Harbor City, in preparation for a packing season on tomatores that is scheduled to start late in June, it was learned today. Other equipment is being moved to Harbor eity from a Wilmington relief cannery. The State Relief Administra-tion is also establishing a cen-tral food warehouse in the ad-pacent building last used by the Drakecraft Boat company of Normandie avenue in Harbor City. Both buildings are being strengthened and remodeled. While details for operation of the cannery are still being worked out by relief officials, it was learned here that the Harbor City piele officials, it was learned here that the SRA garden projects in this section. Surplus crops from other sources may be canned at Harbor City.

State-owned machinery from the Torrance cannery, previousl operated on a cooperative basi by veterans, is said to be in goo condition and ready for oper-tion at the Harbor City plant.

#### **Gas Company Ordered** to Cut Rates July 1

The California Railroad Com-mission vesterday ordered South-ern California Gas Co. to reduce its rates \$1,300,000 annually. Commissioner Ray L. Riley an-nounced. The savings, through-out the system of the utility, will become effective with bills rendered on and after July 1. "This reduction in natural gas rates throughout most of South-ern California is the culmination of an investigation inaugurated by the Railroad Commission sev-eral months ago," Riley said. "It brings to a total of \$5,500, 000 the reductions in rates effect-ed by the commission by its policy of continuous Investigation since Jan. 1. "As the commission's own in-

Yesterday's announce-ment is the third successful rate adjustment to result from these studies. Savings of \$250,000 were announced for the elimination of the hand set charge through the systems of Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co., and Southern California Telephone Co., in Cal-ifornia.
