

## OBITUARY

**JOSEF HANESCHKA.**—Funeral rites for Josef Haneschka of Redondo Beach who died last Saturday at Torrance Memorial hospital were conducted Tuesday at Stone & Myers' chapel. Rev. Frank Meehling, Lutheran church minister, officiated and interment followed in Inglewood Park cemetery.

Mr. Haneschka, who was 70 years of age, was born in Rhumburg, Bohemia, and came to this country in 1892. He had been in the confectionery business for 50 years prior to his retirement in 1924. Mr. Haneschka was a widower, had lived in Redondo Beach for the last 26 years and is survived by two sons, George Haneschka, 2207 Arlington avenue, and Frank J. Haneschka, of West Los Angeles.

**MRS. MILDRED M. SIMMONS.**—mother of Mrs. Mary B. Sims, with whom she lived at 1511 Amador avenue, passed away Monday at the age of 87 years. She was born Feb. 28, 1852 in Mead county, Kentucky and had lived 11 of her 17 years in California in Torrance. She attended the local Baptist church and had many friends here.

Mrs. Simmons is also survived by another daughter, Mrs. Osie M. Butler of Long Beach, and five sons: Don T., of Long Beach; Garland, Ventura; Sashull T., Arlington; Otis and Lorie, both of Oklahoma. The funeral will be held tomorrow (Friday) at 2 o'clock at Stone and Myers' chapel with Rev. C. Miles Northrup of this city's Baptist church and Wesley VanDerlinder of the Long Beach Presbyterian church, officiating. Interment will be at Rose Hills cemetery in Whittier.

**MRS. EVA MOORE DUFFEE.**—mother of Mrs. Willis M. Brooks of 1328 Portola with whom she had resided since 1921, passed away yesterday after an illness of three months. She was born in Scranton, Pa., Oct. 6, 1852, her family being early settlers of Binghamton. Mrs. Duffee had a great many friends in this community where, until her illness, she took great interest in all available cultural enterprises.

She was the only sister of Prof. Willis L. Moore, for more than 25 years chief of the U. S. Weather Bureau. Mrs. Duffee is also survived by two grandchildren, Phillips Moore Brooks and Comet Brooks, a stepdaughter, Mrs. George Dulin of Long Beach; an aunt, Mrs. Phoebe Moore of Binghamton, N. Y., who is in her 96th year; and two cousins, Mrs. Albert Gossert and Miss Ruby Moore of Alameda.

Mrs. Duffee was a member of the Episcopal church, having been confirmed into that faith in 1870 in New York state. Her decease marks the close of a family of Philadelphia Moores, of pre-revolution stock, who settled in that city in its early history and later formed an alliance with the historic Longstreet family, also of Pennsylvania.

The funeral service will be held at St. Andrew's Episcopal church tomorrow (Friday) morning at 11 o'clock, with the vicar, Rev. Thomas R. Marshall officiating. Cremation will follow at Pacific Crest.

The subject of the Lesson-Sermon is "Soul and Body" on Sunday in all Churches of Christ, Scientist. It is our ignorance of God, the divine Principle, which produces apparent discord, and the right understanding of Him restores harmony."

## ALASKA BISHOP PILES UP HIGH FLYING MILEAGE

SEATTLE, Wash. (U.P.)—The Rt. Rev. Peter Thimble Rowe, Episcopal missionary to Alaska, who came "outside" to celebrate his 32nd birthday, said he had spent more than 40 years in the northern territory, attempting to convert natives in many remote villages.

In years past the Rev. Rowe traveled by dog team, averaging 2,000 miles annually, but he now makes his trips by airplane, covering between 5,000 and 6,000 miles every year. He said he expected to remain in Alaska until he dies, since he considered his best work could be accomplished there.
