## Our Star Spangled Banner's Birthday

Next Wednesday, June 14, 130,000,000 Americans will observe an annual Flag Day of unusual significance. For-Old Glory remains a reassuring symbol of democratic stability in a world of bewildering social and political flux—a world where flags fall as fanatical theories flame to destroy human freedom.

Only a quarter of a century ago the flag of imperial Germany flew over the Reich. Later came the flag of the German Republic. Today flies the swastika—symbol of dictatorship, of state dominance over the citizen, of abrogation of individual rights. Over Russia flies the banner of the hammer and sickle—symbol of

purges by firing squads, of regimentation, of fear and betrayal.

No German, no Russian, would dare display the flag of his fathers. But Americans will display and gratefully salute the flag of their fathers—the Star - Spangled Banner that moved Francis Scott Key to write the immortal national anthem, when he saw Old Glory aloft over Fort MeHenry atter a night of bombardment 125 years ago.
