They were Louis Murray, Dale Howe, Wanda Davidson, Jeannette Mikelson, Don Mitchell, Virginia McNally and, on short notice, Director Fariss filled in when the leading man, Robert McNally, was called out of the city.

seen last week in the publication by the Beverly Hills Citizen of the largest issue in its sixteen years of publication.

"We feel this splendid showing is due very largely to a new realization on the part of merchants that advertising really pays," stated Bill Rogers, publisher.

"During early depression years advertising budgets were cut to the bone by advertisers large and small. Then followed a period of inertia in attempting to stimulate business. Today more and more retailers are joining in the thought that after all there is no more powerful method of increasing sales than by steady and

persistent advertising," he stated. Max O. Daley, general manager of the Citizen, who has charge of the development of the paper, stated that all classifications of retail business are broadening their advertising policies.

Instead of occasionally making a half-hearted sales effort, retailers are arranging regular schedules in every issue of the paper, over a period of months. In most all instances these space buyers are obtaining surprisingly good results. They represent the most satisfied of the Citizen's advertising patrons, and they also represent those who are making the best progress, Mr. Daley said.

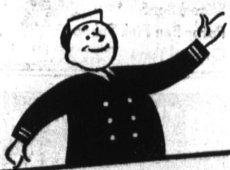
