3-Mile, Limit Tangle Interests U. S. Government

With attorneys allowed an-other 30 days to file briefs, determination of whether Los Antermination of whether Los An-geles country's coastline extends three miles from the shoreline or three miles from a line between Point Duma and Palos Verdes hills will not be reached by the Celifornia Supreme Court until October, it appeared today.

Federal attorneys made it clear
to the court during oral arguments Wednesday that the govermment is seriously concerned
about the beaches, fearing that,
if the high court should rule
that the state line is but three
miles off the coastline, the govermment will be powerless to
prevent ships from discharging
bilgewater too near, the beaches

Irl D. Breet, deputy U. S. attorney, said District Attorney. Ben Harrison had filed a brief as a friend of the court upon instructions from Attorney General Frank Murphy. No direct inference was made that Murphy gave instructions to file the brief during his recent visit here, however. It was filed May 27, court records show.

The government also would be powerless to regulate fishing within three miles of the shoreline if the high court upholds the split opinion of the District Court of Appeal holding that Santa Monica bay is not in reality a bay. Breet said.

Deputy State Attorney Bayard Rhone argued that the courts had held that the state railroad commission had authority to fix rates between the mainland and Catalina Island, thus admitting that state jurisdiction extended more than three miles off shore. He also cited a number of cases including the Ocean Industries case, wherein the high court had defined a bay.
