## Hollywood Bowl Aida Production Massive Affair

Production of Verdi's "Aida" in Hollywood Bowl July 7 and 8 will be a massive affair requiring the services of 300 persons. Pietro Cimino will conduct the opera which is being given as a pre-season event by Southern California Symphony association a few days ahead of the 18th season of Symphonies under the Stars which opens July 11 with Josef Hofmann as soloist.

An all-American Opera cast will sing the principal roles in the Verdi opera. They are Duseolina Giannini, dramatic soprano in the title role; Bruna Castagna, mezzo-soprano as Amneris; Frederick Jagel, tenor as Rhadames; Richard Bonelli, baritone, Amneris; Douglas Beattie, basso, the high priest; resident artists are: Eleanor Woodruff, dramatic soprano as the priestess; Tudor Williams, basso, King of Egypt; and Earl Askam, baritone as messenger.

The Hollywood Bowl chorus of 70 singers trained for several weeks by Hugo Streitzer is an important feature of the opera. The Littlefield Ballet also comes in for a large share of action. The entire Philharmonic orchestra of 87 musicians will play in the pit in front of the huge stage.

## Fireworks Show On July 4th

A crowd of 75,000 will witness the American Legion's seventh annual Fourth of July fireworks Memorial Coliseum this year, it is predicted by Legion officials in charge of the spectacular event for which the nation's biggest single order for fireworks has been placed.

Prices are 75 cents for adults and 25 cents for children. General admission tickets will only be available at the Coliseum the night of the show.

The Taj Mahal in India, world-renowned for its beautiful architecture, is to be reproduced for the first time in fireworks in all its splendor. A thunder and lightning storm will be one of the features of the fireworks display. All fireworks are American made. In addition to the fireworks display, a full-sized three-ring circus will be presented under the direction of Fanchon & Marco.

## Nigger Slough Drain Survey Is Proposed

Encouraged by Supervisor Oscar Hauge's promise that he will support any plan selected, engineer representatives of communities along the Gardena valley drainage course decided last Thursday to meet with H. E. Hedger, county flood control engineer, to complete plans for the lower drainage unit for Laguna Dominguez (Nigger Slough).

The conference of community leaders was held at a Gardena cafe and resulted in tentative plans to request a Federal appropriation of \$600,000 for the work, according to Hedger's estimate. The next meeting will be held within 30 days. L. J. Gilmeister as secretary of the Harbor District Chambers of Commerce arranged the meeting. Called to determine a drainage plan which would be acceptable to Keystone, Gardena and Hawthorne as well as the California Floodway and Landmarks association, proponents of a bird sanctuary plan at Laguna Dominguez, the session heard a report submitted by Mrs. Bertha Fuller of the association and a talk by S. C. Sault, Keystone Chamber of Commerce secretary.

## H. C. Cannery Expected to Open Soon

Indicating early opening of the Harbor City SRA cannery and warehouse, there was renewed activity about the plant at 253rd near Normandie avenue this week. However, officials would not predict when produce from relief gardens in the harbor area would begin moving into the cannery for processing.

Formerly operated as the Tomato Packing corporation, the plant recently was taken over by the State Relief administration and machinery from Torrance and Wilmington cooperative canneries installed. The SRA also has taken over the nearby warehouse and former boat-loading plant and will use these structures as storage centers, officials said.

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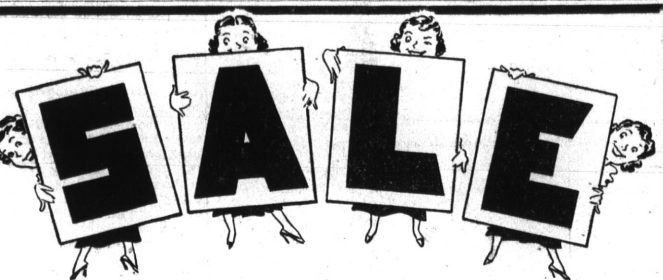
