Prizes in Bingo were captured by Mrs. Burnhard and Mrs. Bay.

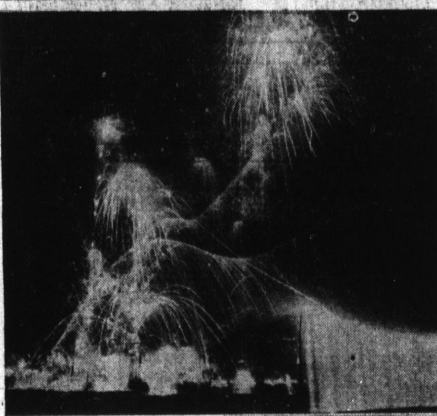
FRIDAY MORNING CLUB

Thrills galore are in store for the 75,000 spectators who will attend the American Legion's big Seventh Annual Fourth of July Fireworks Show & Circus in Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum next Tuesday night. As one entire end of the mammoth structure will be used as a setting for the fireworks display, only three-fourths of the huge seating capacity will be available for spectators. Legion officials point out. Above is shown one of the scores of spectacular fireworks displays, while at the right is shown Tiny Kline, who will make a sensational slide across the coliseum while hanging by her teeth, high in the air. This is only one of scores of spectacular acts in the three-ring circus directed by Fanchon & Marco, which will precede the fireworks display. Reserved seats are now on sale at all Sonntag drug stores in Los Angeles County and at Silverwood's stores in the city. Prices are 75 cents for adults and 25 cents for children. General admission seats will only be sold at the Coliseum the night of the show. As an added feature, two all-expense three-day Greyline tours from Los Angeles to San Francisco, will be given away at the show.

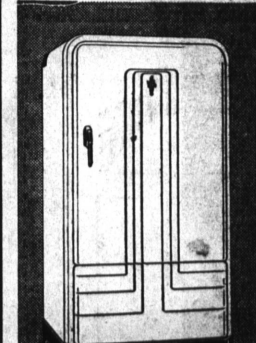
