## Polio Outbreak Being Fought

With nearly two score poliomyelitis cases from all parts of Los Angeles county now under treatment at General Hospital, officials announced today that no expense would be spared to halt the spread of the outbreak which they declared had not yet reached epidemic proportions.

While the number of sufferers from the dread malady now is larger than at any time since the epidemic of 1934-35 the present situation would not be alarming except for the highly contagious nature of the disease, hospital authorities said.

Ordinarily there are only two or three polio cases under treatment at the hospital and the present situation was not revealed until Everett J. Gray, superintendent at the hospital, applied to Wayne Allen, chief administrative officer of the county, for emergency funds to fight the disease.

"The hospital authorities have been informed that the present situation is to be considered as an emergency," Gary told Allen. "Ample personnel and medical attention must be supplied regardless of budget limitations."
