

15 Teams Remain in Race for State Ball Title

THIRD ROUND OPENS TONITE AT CITY PARK

All brands of baseball—from classic league to sand-lot stuff—are being exhibited at the Torrance City Park diamond where California State Semi-Pro games have been held since 1926. Five clubs, El Centro, Shell A. C., Torrance-Lomita Merchants, N. Y. A., of Hermosa Beach and North American Aviation, are leading the title race with two triumphs each.

Successive defeats have caused elimination of Pepsi-Cola, Fort MacArthur, March Field, L. A. Carpenters' Union and Gaffers & Sattler. Third round of the tourney begins tonight with Shell meeting Illinois Cleaners of San Fernando. Other games scheduled for the remainder of this week, starting the third round, are:

Features of Games

Thursday, July 13—Pat Ahern's National Youth Administration youngsters from Hermosa Beach played steady heads-up ball to defeat Standard Oil, 6 to 3.
