Offers Assistance
Permission was granted a "group of unemployed men" to paint house numbers on curbs and solicit (by card) "voluntary contributions" from householders for this service. D. D. Jackson of South Gate asked for this right and City Clerk Bartlett stated that the men had performed similar work in surrounding cities. No set fee is asked and all house numbers are to be inscribed on the curbs with a good grade of traffic paint.

P. E. Outlines Terms
A letter from President O. A. Smith of the Pacific Electric railway outlined the terms for the removal of tracks and overhead wiring on Cabrillo avenue, selling the city the center right-of-way and paving that unimproved portion of the business artery. The sum of \$8,655 is asked for the right-of-way to satisfy mortgage holders and the remaining improvement will be done for \$9,500 or less if the city desires to do the work itself. 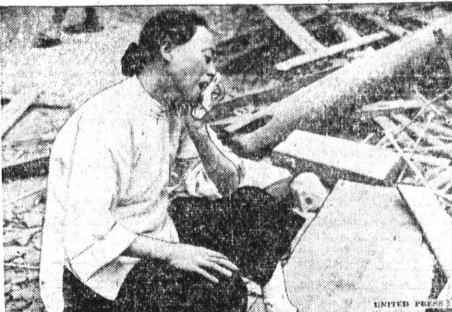
