City Finance Group Given Cabrillo Data

Following a thorough discussion of the proposed improvement of Cabrillo avenue—removal of P. E. tracks and wiring and paving the present P. E. right-of-way from the station to Plaza del Amo—with officers of the City-Wide Improvement association, members of the city finance committee said Tuesday they would consider the matter further with the whole city council.

No commitment was made by the finance group, composed of Mayor William H. Tolson, City Councilmen Tom McGuire and James Hitchcock, concerning the Improvers' suggestion that the Cabrillo betterment be done with municipal general funds. A definite decision is expected to be made on this major city improvement project in the near future after the council as a whole has had an opportunity to go into the matter.

Chairman R. J. Deininger headed the group of Improvement association leaders at the conference Tuesday. The proposal of the Pacific Electric to sell the Cabrillo right-of-way to the city for \$8,055 and remove its tracks and overhead wiring for \$10,300—or less if the city undertakes this job—was reviewed in detail.

It was generally agreed that the entire improvement can be done for about \$12,000. The Improvers are urging the council to use state gasoline tax and general funds for this work rather than create an assessment district or issue bonds.

Borough System, Secession from County Studied by L. A. Officials

County officials are studying the latest proposal by Los Angeles city councilmen for consolidation of the metropolitan area of the county under the borough system of administration. This plan was advanced this week by Councilman Arthur E. Briggs, who in private life is an attorney and dean of a law school.

Along with the Briggs proposal, the city council's planning committee is studying another proposal for withdrawing the metropolitan area from the county and forming a combined city-and-county government. County officials believe the city lawmakers will give up the plan for withdrawing from the county, declaring that the county would get the best of this trade.

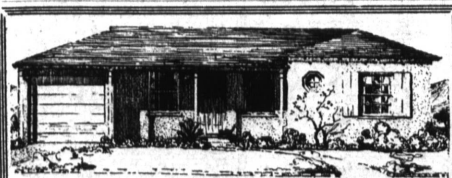
