Business Outlook Promising Says H. S. Firestone Jr.



Tire Executive Predicts Sustained Increase in Sales and Consumption

On his first trip to the West Coast in five years, Mr. Harvey S. Firestone, Jr., Vice-President of The Firestone Tire and Rubber Company, commented optimistically on business conditions, presaging a substantial increase in sales and consumption.

"Business in the second half of the year will be better than in the first half due to favorable credit conditions. Increased purchasing power, current trends in retail trade, building construction, gasoline and electric power consumption, and capital goods activity," the tire executive said.

"In our business we are looking for substantial sales increases for the balance of this year and a continuation in 1940," Mr. Firestone related. "Automobiles will reach a new peak of popularity with registrations totaling almost 30,000,000 vehicles for the first time in history. Indicative of the upward trend in motor transportation is the fact that gasoline consumption this year has increased each month over the corresponding months of 1938, when more gasoline was consumed than ever before."

Claim Race Tracks Using Illegal Method of Computing 'Breakage'

Los Angeles county race track visitors have been "chickened" out of nearly \$2,000,000 in dimes, nickels and pennies by an illegal method of computing "breakage" of odd cents at Santa Anita and Hollywood Park tracks, according to two suits on file today in Superior court.

The suits were brought by Clarence Birney, of 4667 Valley boulevard, acting as a taxpayer, who demanded that Los Angeles Turf Club pay the state \$1,500,000 which it assertedly has illegally retained; and that the Hollywood Turf Club pay \$250,000 under a similar assertion.

As explained by Attorney E. Walter Guthrie, who drew the two complaints, the tracks have been retaining up to 19 odd cents when figuring the redistribution of total money wagered on a race, whereas the law entitles them to retain only odd sums of 9 cents or less.

Possibility that the new state racing commission, expected to be appointed by Governor Culbert Olson this week, might order the turf clubs to pay off hereafter in the next lower multiple of 10, was seen today.

This would mean that hereafter bettors at the track would collect \$4.10, \$4.20, \$4.30, etc. as the case might be.
